

Pound Sterling Is Still Weak

Withdrawal of Official Support Causes New York Price to Slump Further

NEW YORK, Aug. 30: (CP)-The British pound sterling, no longer supported by the gold stabilization fund owing to the international crisis, closed at \$4.381/2 in United States funds yesterday, still hovering around the lowest mark it has reached since 1933. In spite of the withdrawal of official support, the! pound showed a tendency to recover at the end of the week, get_! ting back up to \$4.481/2, but it has been since falling off again.
