RED CROSS REVIVING

Outbreak Of War Brings Local Branch Into Activity

At the joint call of the chairman of the publicity committee and the chairman of the membership committee the executive of the local branch of the Canadian Red Cross Society met yesterday afternoon. In the absence of Mrs. R. L. McIntosh, first vice-president, Mrs. J. B. Gibson took the chair. After the reading of the latter part of the King's recent speech to the Empire and a short prayer to God for guidance the meeting discussed present conditions and it was unanimously decided to send notification of the meeting to the provincial headquarters of the Canadian Red Cross Society asking for wartime instructions on receipt of which a public meeting will be called. To the district officers commanding the military and naval units, to the City Commissioner, to other local organizations with the hope that by co-operation the work may be co-ordinated and energy conserved and to the press.

Those present were P. C. Miller, Mrs. Thomas Andrews, Mrs. George Bryant, Mrs. William Cruickshank, Mrs. J. B. Gibson, Mrs. C. C. Mills and Mrs. W. H. Tobey. Mrs. J. P. Cade and Mrs. R. L. McIntosh were out of town.

When in 1927 the late J. R. Seymour of Vancouver, organizing secretary of the Red Cross Society, visited Prince Rupert and organized a branch of the Canadian Red Cross in this city with the late George Rorie as president, it was understood that this branch would be dormant but be ready to function should an emergency arise. It was felt at the time that Prince Rupert was already over-organized for peace time activities. Of the twenty-eight members of the executive appointed in 1927 nine now reside in the city.

BATTLE OF WARSAW IS RAGING ON

Poles Fight Like Lions and Hold Invaders Back Despite Repeated Tank-Led Thrusts

WARSAW, Sept. 8. (CP)—Battle for Warsaw raged 30 miles north of here Thursday with the Poles fighting like lions and holding back the invaders despite repeated tank-led thrusts. Meanwhile the Germans claimed a fourteen-mile advance had straightened out their line about twenty-one miles north of the capital.

FOOD PRICE TREND HERE

Butter has gone up 3c wholesale and the retail price is being moved up 2c today. Sugar is unchanged at \$5.80 per hundred wholesale although there will undoubtedly be advances. Meats are unchanged and it is even suggested there may be a seasonal drop. Egg prices are up three cents for the week. No rationing measures have as yet been imposed here.

William Moffatt of the local dry dock staff sailed last night on the Prince Rupert for a trip to Vancouver and retail during the past week.

So far at least Prince Rupert seems to have not been affected so very severely by the advance in food prices since the commencement of the war. A canvass this morning showed that flour had advanced \$1.40 a barrel (96 pounds) both wholesale and retail during the past week.
