NO EFFORT TO BE SPARED

A. R. Mosher, president of the All-Canadian Congress of Labor, in a message for the New Year says in part:

"Obviously, the first essential is that the war be brought to a successful conclusion and no effort is to be spared in that gigantic task. But it is noteworthy that, in all the Allied nations, time is being devoted even in the midst of the crisis to considering the aftermath of the war and the plans which must be adopted for such a settlement as will prevent another outbreak. As our own Prime Minister has said we do not want to have to fight a war every twenty years. War is now an anachronism and it is ironic that the immense development of the machinery of production, which might make economic security possible for all mankind, should be utilized to make war more horrible and destructive than ever it has been in the past. The skill and inventiveness which have been perverted to the creation of the implements of war, from magnetic mines to battleships, from aircraft to anti-aircraft guns, might have been used to spread happiness instead of havoc. The intelligence devoted to planning and organization for war purposes would have gone a long way toward such improvements in the methods of production and distribufron as would have ensured economic security and well-being for the masses in every country.
