STICKING TOGETHER

In all matters of public policy there are bound to be differences. There can never be unity of opinion on everything and neither can there be unity of action. Those who have helped to develop democratic opinion are well aware of these differences. All that can be expected is to develop a strong preponderating opinion that will carry such policies as will be best for the country or community. Because the majority of people support something does not necessarily mean that it is right. It is so easy to sway a multitude. Many people make up their minds that something is right and then try to prove it afterwards. Some are influenced by politics. others by religion, others again by class-consciousness. To some people labor is always right, to others capital is always right. To some people Liberalism is always right and to others Conservatism is always right. That is what makes it difficult for a community to act as a unit.
