**DIARY OF COMMONS**

Not since the Great War of 1914-18 had so much interest been manifest in Parliament. Long before opening hour large crowds had assembled outside to witness the arrival of the Governor General. The first indication of the seriousness of the session which confronted one was when entering the Parliament Buildings to find that strict regulations were in effect to preclude the entry of all except Members of Parliament and what is called the working staff. Almost every member was in his seat at the opening when prayers were called and, when the doors were opened to admit those privileged to attend, it was noticed that in the Speaker's Gallery were many notables including consuls from some of the various countries.

The first day's proceedings were short and included documents laid on the table, showing the emergency Orders-in-Council and expenditures which had been passed under the War Measures Act. The Prime Minister, who received a great ovation when he entered, informed the House that it was with reluctance he had to accept the resignation of the Honourable Mr. Dunning, Minister of Finance, who had been compelled to relinquish his position owing to serious ill-health. Mr. King stated that the Honourable Mr. Ralston, who had given up public life in 1935, had decided, at his request, to accept the position as Minister of Finance during the present emergency. The House was informed that

many of the rules of Parliament were suspended so as to expedite the special business for which Parliament had been called together. Mention was made also of the death of two members since the House last met, that of Dr. Young of Saskatoon and the Honourable Mr. Rinfret, Secretary of State, both of whom had passed away rather suddenly. On this occasion there was little formality in the Senate Chamber when the Governor General read the Address to the Throne which address was one of the shortest ever delivered.

Friday, September 8  
The galleries were again crowded to standing room as the House met at 3 p.m. A petition against Canada's participation in war was presented to the House by one of the Members from Quebec. It was noticed that almost every Member was in his place as Colonel Hamilton, Liberal Member for Algoma West, rose to propose the adopting of the Address from the Throne. The proposing of the Address is usually considered an honor. On this occasion it was doubly so—the honor of proposing and seconding going to the two largest provinces, namely, Ontario and Quebec. Colonel Hamilton performed the task creditably and was given a great ovation at the conclusion of his address. Following him was the Secorder of the Address from the Throne, Mr. Blanchette, who spoke in French. They were followed by Dr. Manion, Leader of the Conservative Party, and it is interesting to note that the first three speakers on this special occasion were all men who had served in the forces during the last war. Dr. Manion made a short address, pointing out that it was not the intention of the Conservative Party to be in any way critical during these trying times and that they would co-operate with the government in every way possible. He went after Hitler very severely. (Continued on Page Four)
