**MUCH SNOW IS FALLING**

Winter Lingering in Interior—Roads in Bad Condition

SMITHERS, March 24:—Winter is certainly lingering in the lap of spring in the Bulkley Valley. The past four days has seen an almost uninterrupted fall of heavy wet snow, some ten inches having been added to the already heavy fall for this winter. Country roads and Smithers streets are in a terrible condition of slush and travelling is exceedingly difficult.

Automobiles on local streets find it difficult getting out of the middle of the road to the side of the streets to park and even passing each other is not easy for them.

Trees have been broken and electric wires have suffered from the weight of the snow which is still continuing, sometimes lightly and sometimes heavily.

A number of robins which arrived here Wednesday from the more sunny climate of the south are busy looking around for a place to alight without being in a snow bank.

The train from Prince Rupert yesterday was more than ten hours late.

If a sudden thaw should hit the valley there will be a serious dislocation of transportation of all descriptions as there is an immense amount of snow to go off the ground and the hills and there is likely to be washouts and slides to block railways and highways.

TERRACE, March 24:—The downfall of snow which began on Monday continued until Thursday. There have been intervals of sleet and rain. By Thursday morning the depth measured 26 inches of new snow. Men are removing debris from the sidewalks.

**Timely Recipes**

**COD AND CHEESE AU GRATIN**

3 cups cooked Canada cod  
1/2 cup grated Canadian cheese  
1/2 cup buttered bread crumbs  
2 cups hot milk  
3 tablespoons butter  
3 tablespoons flour

Seasonings  
Prepare a white sauce with butter, flour, milk and cheese and season. Place half the cod—or any other kind of white-fleshed fish may be used instead—in a buttered oven dish; cover with half of the cheese sauce, then a second layer of fish, and the rest of the sauce. Cover with the bread crumbs, brown in the oven.
