which Penrose planned to be buried. Penrose was born in Philadelphia November 2, 1865. His father was professor in the medical department of the University of Pennsylvania. He was educated by private tutors and was graduated from Harvard with a degree in mining engineering in 1886.

Penrose was the youngest of four brothers, all leaders in their fields. The others were Boise Penrose, United States senator from Pennsylvania; Dr. Charles B. Penrose, a Philadelphia physician, and Richard A. F. Penrose jr., geologist.

Early Gold Seeker

Penrose had more "background" than money when he started west to apply his knowledge. He first inspected the mining potentialities of Old Mexico and New Maxico but neither interested him. However, he did realize \$2,000 from the sale of some New Mexico property in which he had invested. Threefourths of this nest egg was gone when he arrived in Colorado Springs early in 1891.

That winter gold was discovered on Cripple Creek. Penrose and a partner, C. L. Two other copper companies were organized successfully and the Penrose fortune bulged. One more promotion, Alaska Gold, completed his big-scale money-making. He sold his shares in Alaska Gold after watching the price soar from 25 cents to \$27.

In Cripple Creek days Penrose had enjoyed the bluff, frontier life as well as his hard-drinking companions. But it had been a raw, rustic existence. He now was ready to make up for that cabin existence. Tall, handsomely moustached, and wealthy, Penrose married Mrs. Julie Villiers (Lewis) McMillan in Paris on April 26, 1906. She was the widow of J. M. McMillan, the son of a Michigan senator, who died in

Switzerland in America

To further his program of enjoying life, Penrose developed Broadmoor, designing it as a year-round resort, the St. Moritz of America. The lay-out attracted a continual parade of celebrities and enabled Penrose to play his best role, that of "mine host." To prevent any derelictions of hospitality that might have been caused by national prohibition, he filled a warehouse with "private stock" before the

eighteenth amendment took effect. Aside from his Broadmoor activities, Penrose was in the public eye chiefly because of his place in Republican party inner circles and his anti prohibition efforts. He was potent in his party after his brother became senator and was one of! the men who picked Warren G. Thomas E. Dewey Heard Last Night | Harding as candidate for the presidency at the "smoke-filled hotel room" conference of 1920.

In his late years he relinquished traction companies.


