Halibut landings at the port of Prince Rupert during the past week totalled 448,400 pounds which was below average in volume. The week's landings consisted of 225,400 pounds from twenty-eight Canadian boats and 223,000 from eleven American vessels. With landings lighter, prices were somewhat firmer. 
