## Chamber Hears Of Road Difficulty Near Drydock

At the instigation of J. E. Bodie, the Prince Rupert Chamber of Commerce last night discussed the question of access to the dry dock and the fishermen's floats in view of the closing of the Hays Creek Bridge. The matter was referred to the civic committee.

In the course of the discussion, City Commissioner Alder told of the unavoidable delays in connection with the rebuilding of the Hays and Morse Creek bridges. He thought the Hays Creek bridge would be the first to be built and the work would commence very soon. The engineer was a very busy man just now. He had more work on hand than he had had for many years.

Recently a barrier had been erected near the dry dock gate, thus preventing the general use of the dry dock private road by the public.

### To Repair Road

The city engineer stated this morning that an arrangement had been made with the Canadian National Railways management that the company would provide road material and the city would spread it in repairing the road past the dry dock and then the barricade at the dry dock gate would be taken down.
