

TAGGING ON POPPY DAY

Canvass This Year To Be November 4—Is Still Important

Preliminary arrangements were made last evening at the Canadian Legion clubrooms by the committee in charge for the annual Poppy Tag Day. This year the Tag Day will be held on Saturday, Nov. 4.

While the present war makes very many and varied demands upon the citizens, yet it has been agreed that these demands should not be allowed to interfere with the even more insistent demands of those who still suffer from the effects of the last war. The Poppy Tag Day is the only appeal made during the year to the general public for funds to alleviate the conditions of many survivors of the 1914-1918 war.

The poppies themselves are all made by disabled ex-service men in the Vetract shops. The local branch purchases all poppies and wreaths from the Vetract shops. The branch also meets all expenses incurred in connection with the tag day from its own funds. The profits made from the sale of the poppies and wreaths are all expended among the families and dependents of ex-service men in this immediate locality. While the response from the general public has always been generous it has actually never been enough to meet the requests received. Nevertheless, the response has been a tremendous help and has meant a great deal to many a family.

Arrangements made last night include the tagging on the streets, the canvassing of houses, stores and business places and the sale of poppies in the schools. Poppy wreaths are now on hand at the Legion and can be purchased at any time or orders may be left there.

Those in attendance at the meeting were Mrs. Robert Murray, president of the Canadian Legion Women's Auxiliary, Mrs. H. L. Landrey, Municipal Regent of the Imperial Order, Daughters of the Empire, J. S. Wilson and Jack Preece who presided.
