Winnipeg is a comparatively young city and yet is stricken with a consciousness of its defects and is seeking to remedy them. To do so means to tear down before she can beyond what is necessary for build up; to have to condemn and purchase property before the railway purposes. municipal improvements can be carried out.

The wise custom which limits the President to two terms, regards the substance and not the form, and under no circumstances will I again be a candidate for or accept another nomination for President."
