TWO-MAN GOVERNMENT

BLOATED COUPON-CLIPPERS

When the yeast of genius
raised that truly great young
statesman, William Bowser,
to such a heaven storming alti-
tude of greatness, it lost its
strength and it has not produced
another like him since. Or else
it sat down, like a pig with a curl
of contentment in his tail, and
has been resting ever since. The
unsacred newspapers of the Lib-
eral school of thought may in
their hide bound bigotry censure
this magnificent male of his spec-
ies, and even endeavor to hold
him up to ridicule, but it is less
majestic to do so, and there ought
to be a law enacted against it.

Doubtless this great states-
man who rules us all so benign-
antly overlooks profanation like
this newspaper blasphemy, sac-
rilege and scoffing. His cosmic
wide point of view would natu-
rally make him tolerant and forgiv-
ing. The Liberal newspapers in
British Columbia are an im-
pious, scurvy lot anyway. Have
they not remarked many times,
with crude impertinence, that Mr.
Bowser, in wicked collusion with

an accomplice of the name of
Dick McBride, had sold the prov-
ince to the railways? Have they
not reviled both Mr. Bowser and
Mr. McBride, a gentleman with
the countenance of a seraph and
the breath rank of Premier of
British Columbia, in most un-
hallowed language? They have
most carnally declared that the
British Columbia legislature is
nothing but a passive body obey-
ing the lightest word of Mr.
Bowser and Mr. McBride.

(These unbelievers of the Fourth
Estate (to the Second Estate, the
Lords Temporal, Mr. Bowser and
Mr. McBride themselves belong)
have stated that the provincial
legislature is a cemetery in which
lie the whitening bones of British
Columbia's hopes of good govern-

MORE CRUISERS

FOR THIS COAST

Rumors Regarding Addition to
the Fisheries Protection Fleet
to Be Built by Government in
Coast Shipbuilding Yard.

Vancouver, March 7.—"Yes, I
heard a rumor round here that
the contract had been let for two
of the three cruisers that were
recently officially authorized for
the Fisheries Protection Service,
but I am satisfied that such is not
the case." In these words, ad-
dressed to a representative of the
News-Advertiser, who had called
upon him, a prominent Vancouver
shipping official, who did not de-
sire his name mentioned, set at
rest a rumor current recently.

There had been a good deal of
speculation as to where the gov-
ernment will have these cruisers
built. One they have definitely
decided to buy, but the other two
they announced would be built in
Canada, and, if possible, on the
Pacific coast. This narrows the
field of surmise down consider-
ably, as there are only two ship-
building yards where a boat of
this class and size could be built,
the Wallace Shipbuilding Yards
at North Vancouver and the Bul-
len's Shipbuilding Yards at Es-
quimalt.

But our informant does not
think the government has yet de-
cided upon the class of boat, and
certainly no tenders have been
asked for. If any such step had
been taken his position is such
that he would be aware of it.

GET SERIOUS

CONSIDERATION

Three of London's Leading Suf-
frageettes Sentenced to Two
Months Imprisonment for Win-
dow Smashing in Street Parade.

London, March 7.—Mrs. Em-
meline Pankhurst, Mrs. Lukes
and Mrs. Marshall, the three lead-
ers of the window smashing cam-
paign the other evening, by which
the suffrageettes succeeded in ter-
rorizing the London tradesmen,
were sentenced each to two
months' imprisonment. These
were the first three of the 124
women who were arrested in the
course of the street demonstra-
tion, and who are to be arraigned
at the Bow street court chiefly on
charges of causing wilful dam-
age to stores in Bond street, the
Haymarket and the Strand, as
well as other busy shopping
streets.

The attorney for the prosecu-
tion announced in court today
that the total damage done by
the suffrageettes in their stone
throwing manifestations was es-
timated at \$25,000, and on behalf
of the government he stated that
the time had now arrived when
the consideration which has been
hitherto shown in connection with
suffragette raids could no longer
be given.

Record Soccer Gates.

Correspondents so often write
asking for information as to the
world's biggest soccer gate that
it may be stated that Scotland
holds the record easily, no fewer
than 121,452 people paying
\$6,762 40s on the occasion of the
international game between Scot-
land and England at Hampden
Park on April 4, 1906. The re-
cord attendance for England is
held by the Crystal Palace, where
in 1901 the Spurs drew with Shef-
field United and 110,802 paid to
see it. Curiously, the Spurs are
also identified with the record
"takings" at any league match,
22,163 having been raked in when
the North Londoners played their
last match of the season against
Chelsea on April 30, 1910.

MORE BODIES

RECOVERED

**Funeral of Five of the Miners En-
tombled by the Diamond Mine
Explosion to Take Place To-
morrow Morning.**

(Special to Daily News.)

Merritt, March 9.—The bodies
of William Baxter and William
Hurd, the last two of the seven
victims of the Diamond mine to
be recovered, were located last
evening and brought to the sur-
face. A brother of the latter
lives at Cumberland and is en
route here. The funeral of at
least five of the men will be held
tomorrow morning, possibly all
of them, at 10.30. Practically
the only damage done was in the
chute where the explosion oc-
curred.

ASSIZES TO BE

HELD SOON

**Advanced a Month in Order to
Help Relieve Congestion in the
Gaols of the Coast District of
the Province.**

Victoria, March 7.—As a mea-
sure of relief from the present
congestion in all provincial gaols
throughout the coast districts of
the province—a congestion large-
ly attributed to the predominance
of the hobo element in Vancouver
and its environs—it has been de-
cided by the Attorney General to
advance the spring term of as-
sises at Vancouver by approxi-
mately one month, and arrange-
ments are being made for the
sitting of this court in the main-
land city on April 9th.
