BOTTLE SHOPS TO BE CLOSED

particular to charge the amount against the board as a whole, not any individuals.

A Manson Legacy.

It will be remembered that this bad debt against the license board of Prince Rupert is part of the legacy of the William Manson influence on the former license board, an influence which dragged through in the dust the reputation of Prince Rupert's license commissioners at that time and caused the fair fame of the city's administration to suffer sorry tarnishing in the law courts and press columns of Vancouver.

Sutherland's Application.

Having dealt with the costs question thus the board began consideration of George Sutherland's application for a bottle license.

Mayor Newton asked if the board desired to hear Mr. Sutherland. It was moved that he be heard and applicant then stated his willingness if it were not the disposition of the board to grant him this license to have the application tabled until next statutory session of the commission.

Ereak Monopoly.

The Mayor desired to make his attitude quite clear. It was that he desired to break the monopoly which he firmly believes exists in regard to the two existing licenses which he declared were improperly granted and therefore favored the granting of a third bottle license.

Commissioner Cade declared his opinion that the legal number of licenses in respect to population was already exceeded by the number of bottle licenses existing and that he did not favor the granting of another.

Abolish Bottle Licenses.

Commissioner Kerr was ready instead to move that the existing bottle licenses be not renewed at the next session of the board, and he did so. The motion was carried. The City Solicitor repeated his theory that bottle licenses are not retail licenses in terms of the act, and do not count in reference to the population limit.

A Hint to Wholesalers.

The Mayor argued that the bottle licenses helped to foster the blind pig industry, which he meant to clean out, and the City Solicitor then said that the wholesalers were very much worse since they kept no record of sales while the bottle license holders did. This, he held, was an important matter in dealing with the blind pig evil, and the Mayor assented. It was then decided that Mr. Sutherland's application be not considered at this meeting, but laid on the table until the next statutory session of the commission.

PANAMA TOLLS

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Washington, March 8.—No decision of the question of Panama tolls was reached at today's meeting of the house committee on commerce and it is possible that the bill will be reported without any toll provision. The majority is believed to favor a paragraph to the bill which would give the President authority to make the rules and regulations governing canal tolls.

IS INVITED TO DAWSON

Duke and Duchess of Connaught and Princess Patricia Invited by Arctic Brotherhood to Visit Yukon Territory.

Dawson, Y. T., March 8.—Camp Dawson of the Arctic Brotherhood voted unanimously to invite the Duke and Duchess of Connaught and Princess Patricia to visit Dawson this summer. His Highness to open the first grand annual exposition showing Yukon agricultural, mineral, forestry, fishery and other products, which is under the direction of the brotherhood.

The exact date of the exposition has not been fixed, but probably will be August 17, Discovery Day, unless the Duke requests some other more convenient date. It is desired that the party come when the Yukon crops are harvested. A formal invitation was forwarded through Dr. Alfred Thompson, M. P. for Yukon, with the request to explain fully the case with which the journey can be made every foot of the way by train and steamer.

A magnificent illuminated souvenir invitation composed of Yukon moose and caribou skins covered with Klondike gold will be forwarded in a few days.

The brotherhood has started elaborate preparations, with Captain Augustine (Seward, Arctic chief, and Charles Settlement, past chief, and a special committee in charge.
