NEW DEPT IS FORMED

Hon. C. D. Howe, Becomes Canadian Minister Of Munitions And Supply

OTTAWA, April 10: (CP)—Creation of a new government department of munitions and supply is announced with Hon. Clarence D. Howe as minister in charge. This will supersede the War Supply Board of which Wallace R. Campbell has been chairman. Mr. Campbell and his organization will be associated with the new department.

Mr. Howe, in addition to the new ministry, will continue as minister of transport for the time being at least.

Announcement of the establishment of the new ministry was made by Prime Minister W. L. Mackenzie King following a cabinet council meeting last night.

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 10:—Proposing arbitration, the United States Secretary of State, Cordell Hull, told Mexico yesterday that expropriation by the Mexican government of American oil companies' holdings in Mexico without compensation was entirely without justification.

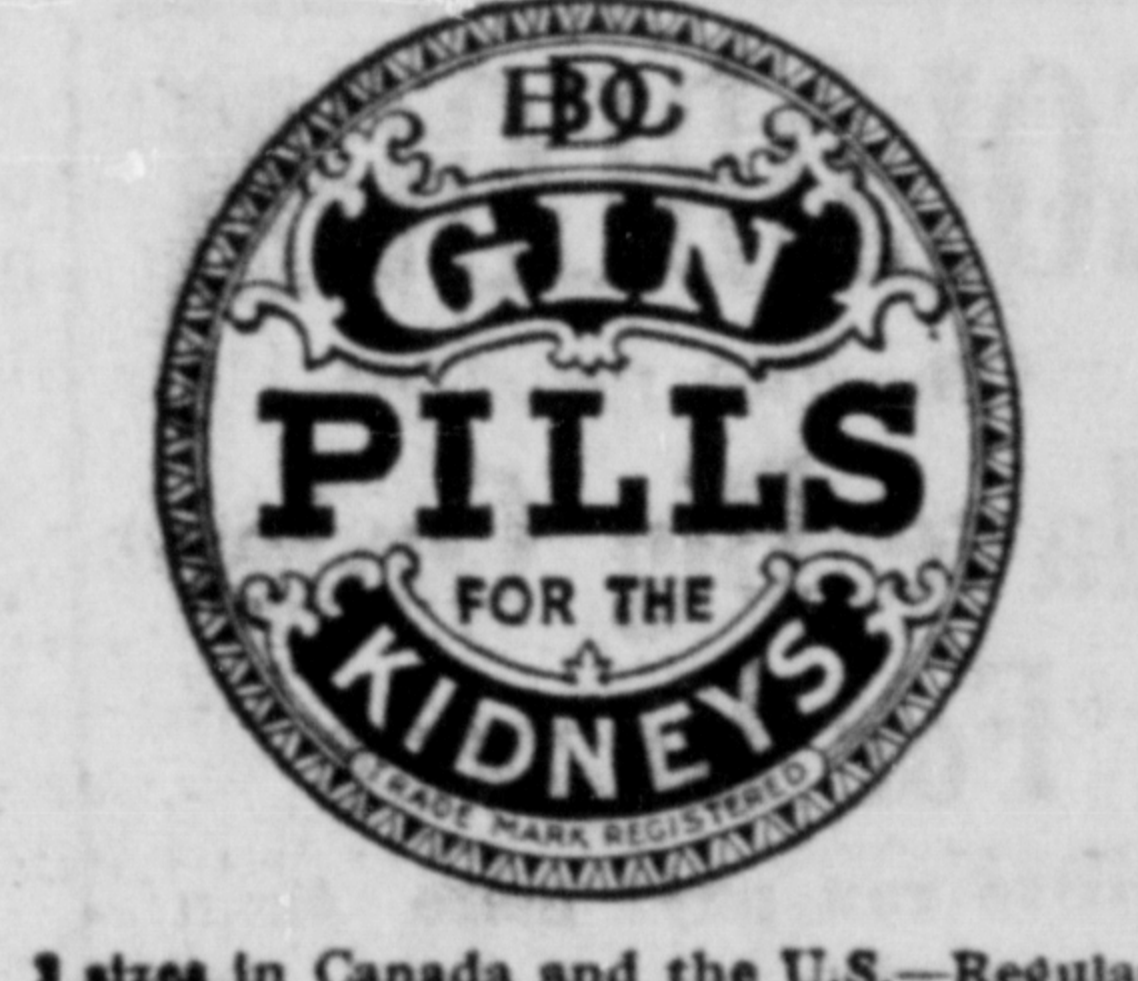
