TWO WORTHY OBJECTS

The lady visitor who was delivering lectures in the city this week, Miss Gaultier of Quebec, was advocating two worthy objects. One was a closer understanding and appreciation of the French Canadian by the English speaking people of the country and the revival of the ancient handicrafts of the people of Quebec and of other parts of the country.

In regard to the relation of the French-Canadian to the rest of Canada, the speaker urged that there should be a mutual spirit of co-operation and tolerance in regard to language and religion and all other questions which might come up. With that we thoroughly agree. There is no good reason why there should be differences. Usually the politicians have been to blame. Both English-speaking and French speaking politicians have shared that blame. Evidently the people fell for it. It is up to the people, both French and English, to check up on the politicians.

In regard to preserving the native handicrafts, we have spoken of that often before. It seems too bad that the natives in the industrial schools should be taught to do cheap tawdry work, like everyone else does and wholly neglect the native arts. We need a revival of native handicrafts in this part of the country as well as in Quebec.

HOLDING IS WINNING

If the Allies can hold the Germans from advancing they are winning the present war. The Germans must win to keep up their morale. They are of different stuff from the British and they react differently. This is especially true when they are fed up as the Germans have been, on false propaganda, false news despatches and false radio broadcasts. They are bound to get some information as to the real condition of affairs and find out that their god that they have been worshipping is only a tin god.

WHISPERING CAMPAIGN

One of the weapons used by the enemy in these war days is the "whispering campaign." It is a campaign initiated by friends of the Germans in enemy countries and is designed to make people doubt their leaders, their defenders and the righteousness of their cause. It is carried out by suggestion. It points out the defects in the British campaign, the weakness of the French, the unreliability of the Allies, the nobility of the Germans and generally carries on a quiet barrage designed to help the enemy. In Canada this is illegal at the present time and any person carrying on such a campaign is liable to be interned. According to general report, there is a lot of this going on in Prince Rupert. Hitler's friends have been busy but this sort of thing cannot be allowed to continue. There has been a great awakening to the danger of this sort of campaign in all Allied countries and steps are being taken to counteract it and to deal with offenders.

are easily borne from the surplus of above-average resources and a huge capital investment program, may prove crushing when only average resources remain and new investment tapers off," it went on.

"Services and a standard of living established and financed by treating capital depletion as current income will be subject to extreme pressure when the first phase of exploitation passes."

The province for years to come would have a per capita income higher than the average but it would also be more variable and vulnerable. The commission warned:

"The necessity of amortizing debt incurred for developmental projects and particularly for those such as the Pacific Great Eastern (railway) which have already proved ill-advised and unproductive, before the best of the resources are exhausted, is clear. Equally important is the most economic utilization of the remaining resources and the development of ways and means of strengthening the economy for the future."

However, "in the meantime British Columbia residents have the advantage of better education and better communal service than has the average Canadian citizen and they have shown a willingness to maintain these standards by submitting to higher than average taxation."

The commission warned against expectation that the "fortuitous coincidence of economic events of the last two decades which proved so stimulating and advantageous to British Columbia will be repeated." The differential advantage would pass.

This is the effect of the commission's public finance plan on British Columbia on the basis of 1937 figures, as given in the report:

Credits

Net debt service assumed by Dominion, 6,540,000; Relief to employables assumed by Dominion, \$3,408,000; Savings on tax collection costs, \$415,000; Sinking funds, \$853,000; Relief works charged to

capital account, \$1,335,000; Total, \$12,551,000.

Debits

Taxes transferred to Dominion, \$3,278,000; Former subsidies (including interim grant), \$1,625,000; Total, \$9,903,000.

Improvement in financial position before consideration of need for a national adjustment grant, \$2,648,000; Total, \$12,551,000.

Local Improvements

Relief assumed by Dominion, \$749,000; Municipal share of relief works, \$11,000; Total \$760,000. Gain to local governments, \$760,000.

In most years the province would gain and the Dominion would lose substantially more than was indicated above. "Transfers are even more favorable to British Columbia taxpayers, since they would involve transfers of taxes which are now considerably above the national average to the Dominion government, and consequently their adjustment to uniform national rates, would leave taxes (provincial and municipal) which approximated the national average in relation to income."

British Columbia "evidently" did not need an adjustment grant at present, the commission concluded. Current above-average services could be maintained and development and conservation expenditures be brought up to pre-depression levels on provincial taxation slightly lower than the Canadian average. British Columbia taxpayers would be saved between \$4,000,000 and \$5,000,000.

The proposed budgetary position (basis 1936-39):

Provincial revenues, \$20,000,000; Expenditures, \$19,000,000; surplus, \$900,000.
