Timely Recipes

DAINTY CUP CAKES

2 eggs, separated
2-3 cups condensed milk
¾ cup sifted flour
3 teaspoons baking powder
1 teaspoon lemon extract

Beat egg yolks with rotary egg beater; add condensed milk and continue beating until well blended. Sift flour once, measure, add baking powder and sift again. Add gradually to first mixture and stir until well blended. Add lemon extract. Fold in stiffly beaten egg whites. Pour into small greased cup cake pans. Bake in moderate oven (350 degrees F.) about 15 minutes. Makes about 24.

Magic Frosting

1½ cups sifted confectioners' (4x) sugar
½ cup condensed milk
1½ teaspoons vanilla

Add confectioners' sugar gradually to the condensed milk, blending thoroughly. Add vanilla. Beat until smooth and creamy. Spread on cold cake. This frosting covers tops of two 9-inch layers or ten and sides of loaf cake or about 18 cup cakes.
