EDITORIAL

Exports Necessary - - -

One of the columnists in a southern paper objects to Canada producing copper for Japan and one reason given is that Canada should devote her whole effort to war work. We agree that Canada should not ship copper to Japan but the argument is not well taken that Canada should devote her whole energies to war work. Unless Canada keeps up some of her export business she will find it difficult to purchase goods from other countries. Already this country is handicapped over ten per cent through the inequality of imports as compared with exports. Our exports pay for our imports. If we continue to import and do not export we shall eventually do neither. It will be noted that, in spite of the fact that Britain is fighting for her existence, she is still shipping goods out of the country in order to pay for the war material she is importing.

China Holding Out - - -

For well over three years the Chinese have been holding out against Japan. They still have a large well trained army of men in addition to hundreds of small groups who continue to harass the invaders. Japan seems to be no nearer winning the war than she was two years ago. All she has done is extend her lines and make it more difficult to hold out.

The Chinese are an unconquered people, their only lack being bombing and fighter planes and a lack of proper ammunition. What steps are being taken to change this situation we do not know.

The reopening of the Burma Road will help China. It is a terrible road but a huge amount of war material has been hauled over it into central China and, doubtless, more will go in that way this winter and possibly during the coming summer.

Canadian sympathy is almost wholly with China in her fight for freedom. This is not only because Japan has allied herself with Germany but because the Chinese are fighting for their existence as a national entity just as the British Empire is fighting for its existence against a ruthless aggressor.
