**Police On Trail of Banned Organ-
ization in Interior**

Corn. Byrl. of Smitners, and
Cons. Clark of Burns Lake, are
busy these days investigating ac-
tivities in the Bulkley Valley district
of the sect known as "Jehovah's
Witnesses".

This organization was banned,
along with others, by the Domini-
on Government in July of this
year. Recently people in different
parts of Canada awoke one Sunday
morning to find that during the
early hours visitors had left litera-
ture on the door step, consisting
principally of a booklet.

The booklets have been judged
largely of a subversive nature and
all members of "Jehovah's Wit-
nesses" may be liable to prosecu-
tion under Defense of Canada Re-
gulations.

Gramophone records, books, let-
ters and pamphlets have been found
in several homes between
Houston and Priestly. The action
spread over a large area even as
far as the coast cities.
