# Editorial

**UNITED STATES ELECTION**  
 The present trend in the United States seems to be toward the re-election of President Roosevelt next month. This trend is shown by the Gallup polls and in other ways. It seems to be accepted in many quarters that Roosevelt will get another term.

And yet we have known elections before where what seemed to be the general trend was upset. This has been true in Canada as well as in the United States. Much will depend on what happens between now and election day. President Roosevelt seems to be lying low. He talks as little as possible and is not likely to be heard from much in the next two or three weeks. Being on the defensive, the less he says the better.

One of the main ideas sweeping through the States is that Roosevelt is the better man to handle the affairs of the country during the war into which it is surely being drawn. He has been quite satisfactory in that respect so far and will continue to maintain the honor of the country without rushing into a conflict for which it may be but poorly prepared.

It is pleasant for Canadians to reflect that, whichever party wins, both are pledged to support the British in the present struggle and to prevent the Germans or Japanese getting any foothold on this continent.

### THE BURMA ROAD

Yesterday China commenced the shipment of materials over the Burma Road bound for the United States and Great Britain. Some of this is mineral for the manufacture of munitions in payment of the Chinese debt to those countries, particularly the United States.

Food supplies and munitions are being shipped into China, a continuous procession of trucks using the highway and passing at suitable points on this narrow route as it travels along mountain ridges and dips here and there into valleys and up again. Thousands of coolies always at work improving this highway can be assembled at any point in a very brief time to repair damage caused by Japanese or other enemy bombers. Those who have watched ants instantly set to work to repair ant hills will realize how the Chinese coolies will instantly set to work on that Burma Road to replace any portion of it that may be damaged either by wash-outs or bombs. Night and day they will work and the Japanese have not enough bombing planes to spare for the job of trying to keep the highway out of commission.

# SEVEN SET HAT PLOTS

NEW YORK Oct. 18. (CP)—Who says women's hats are crazy? Eve Tartar analytical hat designer, has figured out that just as there are only seven basic story plots, so there are only seven basic plots for hats. The most talented designer in the world can do no more than play variations on the seven themes, she contends. The seven are corn, toque, turban, beret, pillbox, brim and calot.

One New York designer shows a true tricorn in a black diamond velour. It depends for variety on grosgrain banding and a new-looking masque veil attached to the hat.

A variation of the toque is a sheared beaver. It has characteristic toque dip over the forehead, but takes on calot traits with a jersey back-of-the-head cap. A towering toque effect is achieved with a feather.

On one turban the designer piles the drapery high, toque fashion, and, as a revolutionary touch, he makes it cover one ear, reveal the other. It is in absinth green jersey.

Whimsical? Well Now—A beret is shown pulled into every sort of shape by whimsical hat designers. The model is a black

felt beret, pulled sidewise with a velvet band and fastened with a gold clip.

The pillbox often appears adorned, in classic form, but it takes on new glamor with a braided-trimmed brim, a cluster of tink tails swooping down from the crown.

Then there's the hat with a brim but what a brim! One designer rings a change on this fundamental hat form by encircling the brim with a band of mink. The crown towers toque-fashion with two clasps in one.

One design shown here might be either calot or toque. The designer says it's both and typical of the season's pompadour hats. It features a baby cap calot with the traditional black Persian lamb sack hat (a version of the top)
