### PICTURING OF EUROPE

ideas from America but for the pattern of institutions and organization they had gone to Great Britain with its principles of personal liberty. To build up a country in such a short time, dictatorship was virtually necessary. It was brave and clever what the Letts were doing in creating such a beautiful state in so short a space of twenty years. Mrs. Watt gave some interesting impressions of the national life of the easy going people—always late and never in a hurry. In the Riga market place still remained the Russian tendency to show off.

In Esthonia was a different type of people—possibly the most fascinating of all in the Baltic States. They were less austere and gayer and they looked towards Paris. They were not afraid of Russia because of its inefficiency but they were in deadly terror of the Germans. Mrs. Watt told of Tallin, a beautiful city, distinctively northern, reminiscent of Peter the Great with heavy architecture having a Moorish touch. The people were charming and alert. They took nothing from Germany or Russia but were determined that theirs should be culture and organization of western type. Their national achievements had been without violence or terror. Proud they were of having achieved by good will results which Hitler had required fear to accomplish. One shuddered to think what would happen when Russia again took over.

### In Finland

Mrs. Watt went on to a description of Finland which she had visited after a flight from Tallin to Helsinki. There had seemed to be a close connection between Finland and the Scandinavian countries. In view of this Finns, while there was talk of it, would not acknowledge the possibility of war with Russia. They prepared in the lovely modern city of Helsinki for the Olympic Games with never an apparent thought that anything might intervene to prevent them from being held. Fine, courageous, valiant, healthy, strong and clean living, the Finns were the people of a country which was a real exemplification of a land of democracy and culture. Withal a charming people with fine sense of humor, they worshipped their muses such as Sibyllus, sculptors, artists and writers.

Mrs. Watt was interesting indeed in her descriptions of concerts, athletic demonstrations and dances and community activities such as weaving, dyeing, apple pressing, spinning and canning around the community centres. Here was a complete example of rural co-operation.

Meals in Finland were extraordinarily good and extensive too. There was nothing outside of Denmark that could compare with them. The farmhouses were the homes of cultured people. It was amazing what the Finnish women had time to accomplish. They were also organized to back up the fighting men.

Mrs. Watt alluded to the tendency of the Finns to poke fun at the Russians owing to their inefficiency and ineptitude. As for the Germans, Finns were appreciative of assistance they had received

### On Scandinavia

Moving on to Sweden, Mrs. Watt said she gathered the idea that Swedes, Norwegians, Finns and Danes would always stand together. They had much in common in language, ideals and customs and all had had to fight for their independence. Sweden was not so democratic as Finland. Swedes were a ceremonial people—strong on etiquette. There had been a great many classes in Sweden but it was to be gathered that this class distinction was breaking down. All women wore uniform dress.

Turning to Norway, Mrs. Watt said Norwegians had been pro-Germans in the last war but they had not approved of the Hitler regime. They were a highly educated people. One was amazed to find among a gathering of women fifty who had graduated from university over fifty years ago. The speaker knew nothing like that in any other country. There was an idea that the position of the peasants and the better off people. There was an idea that the position of the peasants was not sufficiently appreciated in national industry.

Mrs. Watt drew from the Baltic and Scandinavian nations an example of how mixed populations had worked together and learned to co-operate in building up their countries. It was something that might be emulated in Canada. Original cultures and traditions of the people who came to Canada might be retained for the benefit of the Dominion at the same time as real Canadian spirit and culture were built up. There were things that Canada might gain by adapting the best from all countries. Above all, toleration and kindness was required if people were to live together in peace and harmony in the world.

### Tribute To Speaker

Mrs. Fraser, in her opening remarks, expressed the pleasure it was to have Mrs. Watt as guest speaker. She mentioned the high honors that had been conferred upon her not only by the British but by the French and Belgian governments in recognition of her work on behalf of women. The women's institute which she had founded had spread to twenty-nine countries in the effort to bring about better international understanding among women. After the address, Mrs. Fraser duly thanked Mrs. Watt.

Miss Lillian Halliwell presided at the piano to accompany "O Canada" at the opening and "God Save the King" at the closing of the meeting.
