

Armor, manager of the Armour Salvage Co., announces completion of a marine deal of more than usual interest and importance whereby his company acquires the freighter Salvor and the Galt Steamship Co. With the Prince William, which is to be converted from steam to diesel power, the Armour Salvage Co. will institute a regular freighting and towing service between Prince Rupert and Vancouver.
