Union steamer Venture, Capt. Ernest Sheppard, with passengers, freight and mail, arrived in port at 2 o'clock yesterday afternoon from Vancouver via the Queen Charlotte Islands and sailed at 8 o'clock last night on her return south over the same route. The Venture is taking the run for the steamer Camosun which had a collision at the entrance of Vancouver Harbor last week with a Norwegian freighter and had to be withdrawn from service for repairs to rather considerable damage, the most serious of which was the dining saloon being stove in. It is expected the Camosun will have completed repairs in time to resume service with the Vancouver, arriving here about the end of next week.
