EDITORIALS

TURN IN THE TIDE

Every tide that goes out is bound to come in. If the Allies can only hold there is bound to be a turn in the events in Europe. Hitler will not always win. Give us only the mechanized army with plenty of airplanes and we shall show the enemy that one French or British soldier is worth two Germans.

It is possible that some people will think this paper has shown undue optimism in regard to the final outcome of this war. We feel we have not. We shall win as sure as it is that night is bound to overcome evil. We have to remember that we are fighting the very devil incarnate and that Gideon and his hosts won without even firing a shot.

The British and French are paying a very heavy price for their faith in the cause, especially the French. Unfortunately for the French their country is situated on the borders of the barbarian country. That makes it comparatively easy for the barbarians. However we have reason to believe they will yet be stopped and we feel confident the war will be won and the power of the enemy broken.

ANOTHER OPTIMIST

We are not the only optimists. There are thousands of others. Here is what one of our contemporaries says: "Optimistic though we are and must remain as we cast our minds ahead, Italy's entrance into the war, of course, obtrudes many implications. Until the new scene of operations has begun to unfold it would be pointless to speculate. We know, however, that Il Duce's declaration has not surprised the Allies. It will go down in history as the most intensely-pressaginated national policy of this age. But it creates another extensive front. In this, however, Italy may discover greater difficulties for herself than are apparent at the moment. For the time being, therefore, we must keep our chins up and our hearts stout. The brutes are having their innings. Our turn will come. Italy's conscience then will not be as "perfectly tranquil" as Mussolini says it is.

DODGERS IMPROVE

Brooklyn Now Has Clear Lead In National League Standing—Giants Forge Ahead

BROOKLYN, June 15: (CP)—Brooklyn Dodgers assumed a one game lead in the National League standing yesterday as a result of a two to one shut-out of the second place Cincinnati Reds. The New York Giants, in third place, defeated Pittsburgh Pirates in a free-hitting game and, as a result, moved into one-half a game reach of the Reds in the standing.

In the American League, the standing continues close but unchanged with all first division teams winning yesterday over their second division opponents.

Australia Has Record Yields

Previous Year's Carryover Sold and 1939-40 Under Option

CANBERRA, June 14: (CP)—Australia's wheat harvest for the current year, 1939-40, set a record figure of approximately 215,000,000 bushels. A quantity estimated at 20,000,000 bushels was retained on farms for feed and seed and the Australian wheat board received 195,000,000 bushels.

The previous season's carryover of 18,000,000 bushels has been sold, and also 95,000,000 bushels of the current crop. Allowing for home consumption and normal export sales of flour, it is estimated some 55,000,000 bushels remain to be marketed abroad.

Australia wheat growers have been paid some \$90,000,000 in advances for the crop, optioned to the United Kingdom.

OTTAWA, June 15: (CP)—Through careful observation, the muskrat population of northern Manitoba rose from 500 to 200,000 in five years, and 126,000 were trapped this spring. The conservation was planned to give Indians better hunting.

ALDRESHOT, Eng., June 15: (CP)—Gunner John Mousseau, despatch rider with the 51st Anti-Tank Battery from Ottawa, has vowed he won't start out on night manoeuvres again without a few pennies in his pocket.

Bringing up the rear of a convoy, Mousseau's machine struck a hidden obstacle during a blackout, throwing him into a deep ditch. He lay there for half an hour.

Then he grooved his way to a telephone bay station only to find he was without funds. He jangled the receiver frantically, and finally an emergency operator broke in with an indignant demand to know what all the fuss was about.

The injured lad explained his plight and requested that a call be cut through to his duty officer at headquarters of the 1st Canadian Division. An ambulance rushed to his aid.

John, not seriously hurt, was quickly on his feet again. His first call was to Aldershot post office where he paid twopenny for the 'phone call and asked that his thanks be conveyed to the "Good Samaritan" telephone girl.

Army Is First In New Zealand

Filling Ranks of Fighting Men Essential, Government Points Out

AUCKLAND, N.Z., June 15: (CP)—New Zealand has decided the army comes before even essential industries. No man is to be regarded as finally indispensable and where a key man wants to enlist the employer must train someone else to replace him within a reasonable period.

There are to be no totally reserved occupation although some men regarded as indispensable the moment are being asked to remain in their occupations in the meantime. The government takes the view that the first consideration must be the filling of the army.

The age limit for enlistment has been raised from 35 to 40 to ensure that there will not be too many men of the older age groups in later units.
