Editorial

WELCOME NEWS
Local people were pleased yesterday to learn that the local shipyard was to be continued in use throughout the winter. So far we have benefitted from the war and we should be ready to help the Red Cross, buy bonds or in any other way help spend some of the money in relieving the suffering caused by the war.

THINK OF OUR FLYERS
Yesterday's dispatches told of the Royal Air Force going out in the cold mist on their nightly raids over enemy country. As they ascended, the weather became colder until pretty soon the planes were covered with ice and it was almost impossible to keep to a safe altitude. They carried out their duties without a murmur and after returning home, they found that two were missing.

GETTING UP STEAM
The presidential candidates seem to be getting up steam. Wendell Willkie is pouring in volleys after volleys at the political fortress of the President. Mr. Roosevelt had to give up his easy chair attitude and hit back hard at his opponents. By Tuesday next when the ballots are counted steam should be blowing off, even with the monkey wrench hanging on the safety valve.

While the President still seems to be the favorite in the big contest, Willkie appears to be making it tough going for his opponent. The latter is backed by the leader of the C.I.O. and it is said that the pro-Fascist elements are also supporting him. It is just possible that Willkie may surprise the New Deal supporters by introducing a New Deal.

CONSIDERABLE TOLL
In spite of the change of tactics by which the Germans sent fighter planes over Great Britain instead of bombers protected by fighters, the British took pretty considerable toll of the German air fleet Tuesday. Under the former system the losses were so great that it could not be kept up. In one day there were very close to two hundred planes lost or badly crippled. Up to Tuesday evening about thirty of the raiders had been shot down and the rest of the fleet driven off. That was "real rough." It was in addition to the British raids on German objectives where a tremendous amount of damage was done to shipping and factories.

ANOTHER ALLY
Cecilia is now fighting with the Allies against the common enemy. She was ruthlessly attacked by Italy and the attack had been prepared well in advance. In spite of that Italy does not seem to have made much progress. Also the Italian force at Sidi Barrani has been bogged down for a month or more. In view of these facts, it does not seem as if we had much to worry about in connection with the present situation.
