

Production Placer

Streams Yield 108,078
Ounces of Gold in Year

W.A. August 10: (CP) — Days of the Klondike are far ahead, according to the Mines Resources Department's annual report on placer gold production.

Yukon streams yielded during the fiscal year 1939-40, 108,078 ounces of gold, an increase of 17,483 from the previous year.

For almost a half century of operation the famous fields of the Klondike still yield gold-bearing reserves of a size that assures more years of success," the Department says.

The old pan, rocker and sluicing methods, however, have given way largely to huge dredges, mostly operated by electricity developed from the water power of the area. During the fiscal year 11 dredges operated and they handled more than 10,000,000 cubic yards of gravel.

There were 2,644 claims of good standing, of which 2,502 were in the Dawson district, 103 in the Mayo district and 39 in Whitehorse. "The high price of gold in recent years has resulted in increased attention being given the Klondike," says the report. "Placer operators are working over the old Klondike diggings and the lower grade ground which was neglected in the days of '98."

Prospecting for placer gold increased and extensive stripping and thawing operations, preliminary to large-scale dredging, were carried out on several claims.

BIG PARTY FOR NORTH

Churchill Special Leaves Winnipeg With Largest Tourist Group Of Year

WINNIPEG, Aug. 10.—On board the Churchill special when it steamed out of the Canadian National station yesterday was the largest group of Americans to visit the sub-arctic on this annual excursion. They came from New York City, Philadelphia, Washington, Cleveland, Akron, Fresno, Stockton, Los Angeles, from the states of New Jersey, Colorado, Virginia, Indiana, Nebraska, as well as the usual large contingents from Illinois, Minnesota and North Dakota.

Among the tourists was a representative of Life magazine, New York City, who flew to Winnipeg to take part in this excursion, of Collier's magazine and of the Daily News as well as the Journal of Agricultural Research of the Department of Agriculture of the United States.

Canada was also represented with groups from Winnipeg, Fort William, Regina, Prince Albert and Ottawa. There was one lone representative from Uruguay in South America, who is looking forward to his trip north of '54.

For one week, the excursionists will live on their special train. During that time they will visit Dauphin and take a drive to Riding Mountain National Park. At Flin Flon they will visit one of the largest mines on the continent and will be the guests of the town in the evening. Churchill will be the next stop and there the attraction will be white whale hunting, a visit to Fort Prince of Wales which has been restored by the Dominion government and, not least, the dance in the evening. Eskimos, Indians, Royal Canadian Mounted Police, trappers, traders and sailors are flocking to the northern seaport now to meet the excursionists and be present for the biggest event of the year.

The party will return to Winnipeg on August 15.
