Timely Recipes

TAFFY APPLES

2 cups sugar, 1 teaspoon cider vinegar, or 1/4 cup corn syrup, 1 cup water.

Cook sugar, vinegar or corn syrup and water in small saucepan, stirring until sugar is dissolved. Boil without stirring until syrup forms a hard brittle ball when tested in cold water. Remove syrup from fire and set over a pan of boiling water. Add a few drops of red vegetable coloring. Wash and polish medium sized red apples. Insert a wooden skewer in blossom end of each and dip in syrup, turning until well coated. Place on waxed paper until cool.

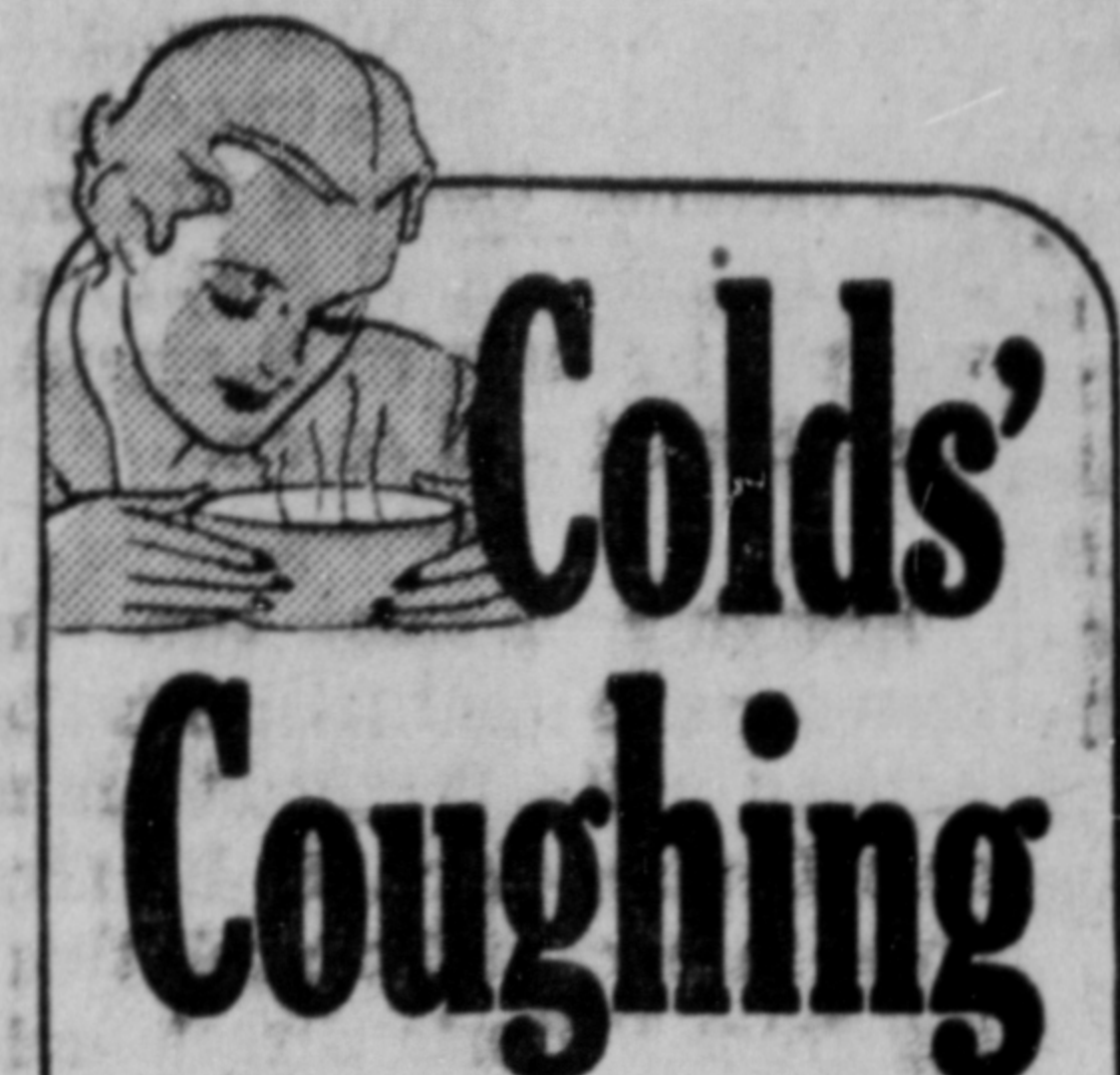
