UNDERWOOD IS AGAINST RECALL

Democratic Presidential Possibility States His Position Regarding Initiative, Referendum and Recall.

Oscar W. Underwood, the Democratic leader in the House at Washington, says that he is utterly against the initiative and referendum. He says: "I believe that it is subversive of the very form of our government. It is the negation of representative government. It is wholly reactionary and not progressive. I believe, however, that the initiative, referendum and recall should not be placed in the na-

tional platform, but that as a local matter it should be worked out in each state, and not be made a party issue. I am absolutely against the recall, but I do not believe the recall, even in its worst form—the recall of judges—to be so dangerous as the initiative and referendum. The recall of an officer merely affects the tenure of an office. I believe that at reasonable intervals the people should have an opportunity to re-elect their officers, and short terms of office could accomplish much more than the recall."

COBB SLIDES FIFTY FEET

Baseball Man Tries Racing on Frozen Ice.

Ty Cobb, world's champion batsman, recently attempted to slide over the frozen surface of the Detroit River. As a preliminary to the novel experience, he tested his ability as a broad jumper in trying to leap over a crack in the ice. He fell short and fell in, getting thoroughly soaked.

Feeling that he could do no worse on runners, Cobb boarded

As a decorative member of the crew Ty was a success, although his inability to understand a sudden order of Captain Mitchell having something to do with a mysterious bit of rigging known as the "sheet" (Cobb said he saw a sail, but no sheet), caused the craft to capsize while going at the rate of about sixty miles an hour. A fifty-foot slide along the ice, which was covered with an inch of slush, resulted.

TRUTH ABOUT SIXTY MILE

Mining Inspector Reports Sixty-five Shafts Sunk to Bedrock and in Most of Them Not a Color Found.

T. D. Macfarlane, government mining inspector, has returned from a trip to Sixty Mile, says the Dawson Daily News, respecting conditions there, he says:

"Since my visit to Matson the first week in February I find that considerable prospecting has been done on the creek; also on Weide, Christmas, Borden, Fortier, Angus, Marion, Nettie, Emma and Pine creeks. There is probably in the neighborhood of sixty-five shafts sunk to bedrock in the entire district and from all reports and information that I could gather from the men who did the prospecting there is not a prospect found, that is to say, sufficient prospect or gold to show evidence of pay. Some light colors have been found, but I am satisfied that the total value of gold recovered outside of Matson's discovery and No. 1 below would not exceed fifteen cents. Mr. Dyke, the owner of No. 1 below, claims to have taken out forty cents from the first pan. This gold was in two pieces, but he was unable to get even a color from other pans taken from the same shaft."
