After spending several weeks inspecting the condition of sanitation among the railroad construction camps along the route of the Grand Trunk Pacific, Dr. A. E. CHINESE ARE SELLING GIRLS

In Famine Stricken Districts Girls Are Sold for Less Than a Dollar—Little Demand for Boys.

Shanghai, March 19.—Children are selling in the Central China famine district today for a trifle less than \$1 American money each. Not in years have such bargains been offered. Speculators are investing heavily in promising girls. Boys are not so much in demand.

The fathers and mothers who are selling their own children to strangers say that they have no choice between selling them and seeing them starve to death. Already the people of the famine districts are dying by wholesale, either of directly starvation or of the diseases which attend it.

Canada destined to be the controlling power of the British Empire! Earl Grey's prophecy has a ring that drowns the echoes of Champ Clark's exordium on annexing the land of the aurora boreal. The former governor general of the Dominion was telling his countrymen at home, in an address leading up to his remarkable pronouncement of the loyalty and patriotism which imbues all parties in British America. Seemingly sharing the view held by Englishmen who look far into the future of the empire, Earl Grey said that as the United Kingdom could not forever hope to play alone her present part as a maker of righteousness throughout the world, the highest of all duties that lay before the present and coming statesmen of all parts of the empire was the solution of the problem of welding the autonomous portions each to develop the strength of its own free aspiring nationality.—Washington Post.
