Tea and coffee are costlier because of increased duties, sugar is up about 50 cents per 100 pounds and butter is up about five cents a pound. But most household groceries are lower in price than a year ago, balancing the total cost of living to about its pre-war level. Experts predict there will not be the sharp advance in prices there was in the last war because many products are under control of government agencies.

Importers of special food brands say their stocks do not average an increase in price of more than five per cent but there will, doubtless, be a larger increase shortly because of war-risk insurance and other war expenses.
