

BRILLIANT RAIDS

The British air raids of yesterday and the night before on the Island of Sylt seem to have been brilliantly executed war events, well planned and carried out without much loss. It is one of the outstanding events of the war so far and reflects credit on Royal Air Force.

It seems that it was from Sylt Island that the German airmen came who bombed Scapa Flow recently. The destruction of the hangars at that point will make it more difficult for the enemy to repeat the invasion.
