## MAKING UP TO BRITAIN

Not So Enthusiastic About Going to War on Side of Germany, Spokesman Suggests

LONDON, March 21: (CP)- An authoritative Soviet spokesman is reported to have declared in London today that Russia is well aware that Germany is endeavouring to drive Russia into war against the Allies, an eventuality which, the Great Britain to make us friends

"Great Britain paid millions for the same for us?" Russo-German commercial relations need not prevent Russia from remaining strictly neutral nor from negotiating for trade with Great Britain and France. The Allies could provide TransCanada Air Russia with much-needed machinery in return for which raw materials would be sent by Russia.

"The Soviet seeks peace and wants to keen out of the European Net Operating Deficit of \$236,269 war," according to the spokesman who said that, when Russia had sought British mediation in the Russo-Finnish war, the Soviet had made definite overtures of friendship to Great Britain through the Russian ambassador to London, Ivan Maisky, to Under Foreign Secretary Richard Butler.
