Need Vitamin A With Blackout

Such Foods Are Essential For Better Sight Say Medical Experts

LONDON, March 21: (CP)—Foods containing vitamin "A" are essential if one wants to see in the blackout, according to Dr. Leslie Harris and Dr. M. A. Albany.

Principal sources of the vitamin are milk, butter, carrots and greens. And two pints of milk a day are sufficient to prevent blindness developing. The doctors say that German scientists are trying to find an ersatz for this vitamin to prevent their countrymen suffering "night blindness."

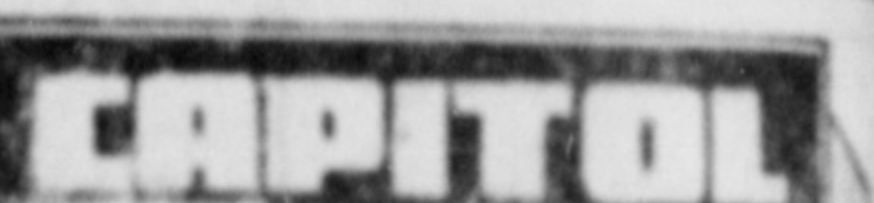
