MINE LOOKS VERY GOOD

Machinery to be Installed on Hunter Basin Property Near Telkwa

SMITHERS March 21.—The crew of men under Frank Simonds, who drove two hundred feet of tunnel on the Hunter Basin property, which lies southwest of Telkwa and is under option to the Conwest people, finished their contract and moved in to Smithers a few days ago. They report that the property is looking fine and that good ore was encountered while the work was in progress. It has now reached the stage where hand work cannot be carried on very economically and it is expected that some machinery will be brought in to continue exploration of the property.

Some road is required to be built this season to facilitate the carrying on of the work and it is hoped an appropriation will be granted by the Department of Mines for this purpose.

Mr. Tomlinson M.E. is in charge of the property and he makes his headquarters at Telkwa.

SUPPORT RESIDENT

PRINCE GEORGE, March 21.—Speaking at a campaign meeting here, Fred Stephens, National Government candidate for Cariboo in the federal election, made much of the point that neither of his opponents, J. G. Turgeon, Liberal, or William Irvine, C. C. F., were residents of the riding, one not even being a resident of the province. CHURCH AT KITWANGA

Question as to Whether Salvation Army Should Come in Again Under Discussion

KITWANGA, March 21.—There is still discussion at Kitwanga as to whether or not the Salvation Army should be permitted to enter this mission field which it is claimed under agreement in 1889 with the late Rev. A. E. Price was to be exclusive to the Anglican Church.

David L. Wells has been endeavoring to organize the Salvation Army here, saying that provision for this effect was made as far back as 1921.

Harold Sinclair, visiting Hazelton recently, took the matter up with the Indian Agent, S. Mallinson, who said it would be referred to the Department of Indian Affairs.

Meetings have been held and the Department has been asked to restrain the Salvation Army from be-

coming active here on the grounds that the presence of two church organizations would create division among the small population of 145 in the village.

Following Mr. Sinclair's visit to Hazelton, a meeting was held at the home of Chief Henry Lelt with Chief George De-Wel-Lesque as chairman and the Anglican missionary, John Hayhurst, also present. Again it was decided, if possible, to prevent the Salvation Army from coming in.

CAREER OF UNTERMAYER

NEW YORK, March 21. (AP)—Winning riches and fame as one of the highest paid corporation lawyers in the United States, Samuel Untermeyer of New York, who died in California, turned in his late years to internationalism in behalf of the oppressed of his race as Zionist and philanthropist. Elected president in November, 1934, of "The World Non-Sectarian Anti-Nazi Council to Champion Human Rights," he directed a widespread boycott against Hitlerite Germany.

He managed always to keep his personal ideas from tinting his professional activities. He was a foe of "the trusts" yet once earned one of the largest fees on record, \$775,000, for bringing about a merger of the Utah Copper company with the Boston and Nevada Consolidated Companies, a \$100,000,000 deal.

He was denunciatory of "Wall Street" but 15,000 shares of Bethlehem Steel, purchased before the world war as an investment, yielded him \$6,000,000 profits in 1916.

ST. PAT'S DAY IS OBSERVED

OCEAN FALLS, March 21.—The Ocean Falls branch of the Canadian Legion held its annual St. Patrick's ball last Friday. The hall was well filled with gay trippers, all a-wearing of the green. In the prize drawing Mr. Lissimore won the first prize, \$100, and Mr. Calderhead the second, \$50. Refreshments were supplied by the Women's Auxiliary.

On Saturday a St. Patrick's party was held in the school gymnasium by the Junior and Senior High School pupils. The hall was beautifully decorated in green and white and dancing music was supplied by the boys' orchestra. Miss Jean Potterton and Miss Nives Pistor, as Bridget and "Paddy," gave some delightful Irish jugs. Very appetizing refreshments were served including a St. Patrick's birthday cake, cut by Miss Long. The hostess of the evening was Miss Eleanor Bryant. The convener of the committee was Miss Nives Pistor, and a vote of thanks was appropriately given by Miss Fay Lois Sweeney.

He acted as counsel for several labor unions, often defended the American Federation of Labor from accusations of radicalism and frequently was a labor mediator in industrial disputes. Once he saw fit to exorcise the Jewish Bakers' Union as "dictatorial."

Huge Land Deal Negotiated

He figured in several famous divorce suits.

In one of the largest land deals on record, he arranged in 1921 for the purchase by an American syndicate of the properties of the Archduke Frederick of Austria, valued at \$200,000,000 and scattered in seven countries.

He was a patron of the arts, giving freely to musical organizations. He opened his purse wide to Jewish charities and his gifts to the Hebrew University in Jerusalem ran into six figures. He was active too in many non-sectarian charities.

It was once said on good authority that Untermeyer received at least \$1,000 for every day he appeared in court but there was an exception in the case of a penniless woman who had stabbed her husband to death in an East Side brawl. Untermeyer defended her, pleading self-defense. In 10 minutes the jury reached a verdict of not guilty and the foreman then said that most of that time was spent debating whether it would be proper to give the woman a purse of \$500.

A born politician, Untermeyer preferred to be active in inner councils of the Democratic party and consistently discouraged attempts to make him a candidate for high office. When put forward for an appointment by President Wilson as ambassador to France, he stiffed the plan. William Jennings Bryan once named him as one of the men he would support for the presidency.
