MAY ENLARGE RUPERT DOCK

Dominion Must Have Docks on This Coast Capable of Accommodating Vessels a Thousand Feet Long—Bill Passed.

Ottawa, March 26.—Late last night in the House of Commons Mr. Monk's bill to increase the aid to dry docks was passed. The increase of capital cost on which the country must pay interest is from four millions to five. Questioned by Mr. Pugsley, Mr. Monk said no special order rises in view, but it is believed that before long the opening of the Panama Canal would necessitate the construction on the Pacific coast of dry docks capable of accommodating vessels one thousand feet long.

ALEX. MANSON IN THE LEAD

West Coast of Queen Charlotte Islands Will Give Him Large Majority—Conservative Leader Concedes This at Meeting.

H. S. McRae and A. H. McPherson have returned from a tour of the west coast of Queen Charlotte Islands in the interests of Alex. M. Manson, and Mr. McRae says the trip was successful beyond their most sanguine expectations. They held a large meeting at Queen Charlotte City and captured practically the whole house. There were four Socialists, two of whom will vote Liberal, and he would concede to the William Manson party only two votes. In fact, at the close of the meeting it was the president of the local Conservative Association who moved the vote of thanks and said that it was a hopeless case for William Manson in that town, but he still hoped that his candidate would be returned.

They also visited Lawn Hill, Ti-Ei River and Miller Creek and found the ranchers to a man would vote against the present condition of things and for Alex. Manson. At Paced and Jedway they also had successful meetings and are assured of a very large majority for Alex. Manson.

now you have lost yours." There was renewed laughter, in which, of course, the sly fox who had lost his Liberal tail did not join. Mr. Segouin is a good speaker, however, accustomed to platform incidents, and made a good speech on the issues of the day from a Conservative standpoint, eliciting applause when he eulogized Sir Wilfrid Laurier, but being booed when he said the reason he had left the party was that he did not agree with Sir Wilfrid on the Asiatic question. Mr. LeBlanc made a speech on behalf of the Socialists, and Mr. Angers closed the meeting. As soon as he mentioned Mr. Segouin's name an expectant titter ran through the audience. Mr. Angers said:

"The first time I came to Prince Rupert one of the first notable sights I witnessed was the noble Segouin delivering an address of eulogy to Sir Wilfrid Laurier. Now I find him slandering the memory of that great statesman. Necessarily his conduct is comparable only to that of Judas Iscariot. But Judas was ashamed and went out and hung himself. Segouin will not do that for the reason that the Conservative machine has placed a few oats in his manger, and the halter of honor has not been strong enough to hold Mr. Segouin back from them." Roars of laughter followed.
