# NAZI SLAVE SHIP AGROU. LERE BOARDED BY BRITISH

The Nazi prison ship Altmark is pictured fast in the ice of Jossing Fjord, Norway, after she was arded by tars from the British destroyer Cossa ack in violation of Norwegian neutrality. The Altark, which served as an auxiliary to the late German pocket battleship Graf Spee, carried 326 Briseamen in her holds. The men, crews from ships sunk by the Graf Spee, were freed and bught to Scotland by the Cossack. The action of the British brought about an exchange of notes the three nations involved and was one of the incidents leading up to the present situation.

... Unconfirmed reports from Stockholm via Amsterdam said that a 26,000-ton German battleship had been sunk. The dispatch said that other German warships had also possibly been sunk but gave no details.

From northern Sweden it is reported that at east two German ships were sunk at Narvik which been the base for shipment of Swedish ore to ermany. Fifteen German cargo vessels are reporttrapped there.

# Highlights Of Situation As War Extends To North

Germany invaded Denmark and Norway during the night. Denmark has accepted German "protection" under protest and the Nazis have taken over Copenhagen and other important points without resistance.

Norway has declared war on Germany and is "defending itself to the best of its ability." German troops have been landed on the Norwegian coast. Oslo and other Norwegian cities were bombed from the air last night. Despite resistance of shore batteries, German naval craft have entered Oslo Fiord and the city was reported occupied today, seat of government being moved to Hamar.

Prime Minister Neville Chamberlain told British Parliament today that British naval units were engaged in defence of Norway against German aggression but it was not in the public interest to give details at this stage.

Soviet Russia sees no reason for armed intervention in Scandinavia at this time. The Soviet intends, says a statement, to fight neither German or Allied battles and intends to take no action unless Soviet frontiers are menaced.

Although Germany was reported to have mined its coast. Sweden had not become definitely involved up to this morning although a state of emergency had been declared and expectation was that it too would soon be in the war.

NEW GOVERNMENT NORWAY BERLIN - A German news agency announced in a dispatch from Oslo that a new Norwegian government had been formed. The proclamation giving effect to the change was read from the Oslo radio station by Major Vidkin Quisling, head of the Norwegian Nazis, who declared he was head of the new government.

FIGHT TO VICTORY LONDON-In a message to the Norwegian people Foreign Secretary Viscount Halifax declared today: "Side by side Great Britain and Norway will fight on until victory is attained."

Norwegian Capital Yields To Germany-Half Of Population

STOCKHOLM, April 9: (CP)-Oslo surrendered at 7 o'clock this morning Pacific Standard Time. The Norwegian Army was reported guarding the defence line between Oslo and Hamar which is the new capital.

Fully half the population is reported to have left Oslo before the surrender.

The Germans landed from warships along the harbor. Reports are also confirmed of German troops landing at Trondheim, Bergen and Vallo, Kristiansund on the northwest coast being bombed.
