## Timely Recipes

### MACARONI WITH MUSHROOMS

1/2 package macaroni  
1 onion  
2 ounces butter  
4 tablespoons oil  
2 slices of bacon  
6 ounces of dried mushrooms or 1 lb. of fresh mushrooms  
few sprigs parsley  
salt and pepper  
Chop the onion, parsley and butter, oil, salt and pepper and let fry until the onion becomes golden brown. Add the mushrooms (if they are dried mushrooms, they must be parboiled). If instead they are fresh then they must be washed in lukewarm water, well drained and cut into small pieces. Cook for about 20 minutes. Use this sauce over the macaroni already separately cooked. This recipe will serve four.
