



To the Voters of Skeena:

The Liberals of the Skeena district are in this fight as a protest against the McBride-Bowser administration, in that:

Settlement of the land is being held back by the selling of Crown lands to speculators, and the impossibility of finding out what land is still open for pre-emption.

The credit of the province has been pledged to build railways which parallel other roads, while the northern portion of the province with its vast resources only awaiting railway facilities, to develop them is left almost entirely unprovided for.

The government has alienated large areas of the timber of this district, disposing of one of our most valuable assets, and does not return adequate improvements for the money received, but has squandered it for the purpose of making itself secure politically.

The present system of taxation is onerous and unjust. The control of the police and license commissioners in the hands of the Attorney General is used for political ends. The civil service has been reduced and has become the most contemptible of all political machines.

McBride's Antomaton

Through a dismal array of trite repetitions of the well known doings and general policy of the McBride Government, William Manson steadily waded. With scarcely a change of tone he recited his little list like an automatic dummy. One could almost fancy the figure of Dick McBride turning the handle behind him. It was all very smooth and very beautiful, just like butter-milk gurgling from a jug. But nobody seemed to appreciate it. There was no applause.

The Silent Supporter

About the timber policy William Manson talked, and about the land policy, admitting quite glibly the evils and hardships worked by these on intending settlers, but saying they couldn't be helped. He spoke of the sale of government lots in Rupert. The Ring can cook up a convention and they can cook up this constituency; but this constituency is going to give William Manson the greatest roasting you can imagine.

We should have had redistribution before election, then Skeena would have had three members.

This district is entitled to an appropriation of one million and a half instead of a miserly \$354,000.

William Manson is going to get but few votes from Hazelton.

William Manson said to me once: "The only thing to do is to take the bull by the horns." Why, he hasn't spunk enough to take a lamb by the tail.

Alex. Manson's Bright Sayings.

William Manson and I were invited to this meeting at the same time. For reasons of his own he has refused to attend. I invite him to my meeting tomorrow night. I will give him an hour and a half if he wishes and will confine myself to ten minutes in reply.

The Conservative party is disorganized; all over the riding the people are rising against Ring Rule. Dr. Clayton is a Conservative, yet he is against it. On that principle we stand shoulder to shoulder, and if I am not elected your member it should be Dr. Clayton.

The man we are fighting in this campaign is William Manson. We have tried him both as mayor and member and in both positions found him wanting.

I ask you in all seriousness: Is it fair to take money out of the public treasury and use it for campaign purposes?

At Hazelton I found the names of many old timers missing from the voters' list. I find that it is the practice to place on the lists only those known to be Conservatives, and the declarations of those found to be Liberals are not turned into the registrar of voters.

The voters of Kispiox asked William Manson for an appropriation of \$22,000. "How many votes have you," they were asked. The number was given. "Too big an appropriation for that many votes," was the decision of the member, and yet your ex-member told them at Kitsumkalum that it would not be fair or honest to discuss the distribution of appropriations on the eve of an election.

Along the Skeena river there are twenty-five applicants for licenses. No one knows whether they will get licenses or not until after election. If you are

good you get one; if not you don't. Frank Angers spoke at Terrace on behalf of the Liberals. His employer, a licensed hotel keeper, was called upon to immediately discharge Mr. Angers, and he had to do so.

My friend the Journal says that if you do not return a straight government candidate something is going to happen. What an indictment of McBride—appropriations to be effected by one question of whether a representative be Liberal or Conservative and not by the needs of the district—what an indictment!

William Manson has failed as a friend at court. I would stand a better chance of obtaining proper appropriations than he does. And I would see that our money is spent fairly and squarely. I would have no road foremen asking the hotel clerk to sign a receipt in blank. I would have no road foremen winking to the clerk and saying: "Aren't you on?" Fellow electors of the city of Prince Rupert, "Aren't you on?"

Montgomery's Socialism.

The Conservatives have never passed any legislation for the working classes and the Liberals have done very little better, so the thing was to start a new party and I am the representative of the Socialist party.

Dr. Clayton says William Manson hasn't courage to catch a lamb by the tail, but I notice he commandeered a government boat to Stewart and government teams from Hazelton to Alderney, and swiped a hand car on the railway; so I think he might be able to tackle a lamb.

Mayor Newton has turned over so many times that he has no square sides on him.

You are not content with conditions in Prince Rupert; you want to get rid of Ring Rule for all time; then why not change the whole business.

We have had William Manson as mayor and he was a failure. At Stewart he said he would not pledge himself to support any measure that might intimidate capital.

If you want to get rid of Ring Rule, of which we have so much in this city, you must support the Socialist candidate. Ring Rule is going to get a nasty drop on the 28th anyway.
