ELECTION MEETINGS

Liberal Gathering in Smithers Monday and C.C.F. on Tuesday

SMITHERS, March 20.—The final Liberal meeting of the federal election campaign in Smithers was held in the Reo Theatre Monday evening when M. P. McCaffery, Dr. W. T. Kergin and Senator J. H. King addressed a good-sized audience. The speakers were all listened to with close attention and there were no interruptions and no questions asked at the end of the meeting.

The same speakers addressed a meeting in Hazelton on Saturday night when the large new hall there was packed to capacity and some were standing who could not find seats.

On the way to Smithers from Hazelton they held an afternoon meeting at Evelyn which was very well attended on short notice.

Senator King left Smithers on Tuesday morning's train for Vancouver via Cariboo while Dr. Kergin left on the noon train for Prince Rupert.

Mr. McCaffery, with several local speakers, will hold meetings at Round Lake, Houston and Burns Lake before he returns to Prince Rupert on Saturday's train.

The Co-operative Commonwealth Federation candidate, George Weaver, held a meeting at Telkwa on Monday evening when twenty people attended to hear him expound the theory of his party. He addressed a meeting in Smithers on Tuesday evening.

This is the quietest election campaign ever carried out in this district and the reason that is ascribed to this situation is that the election of both Liberal government and the Liberal candidate, Olof Hanson, is very much a foregone conclusion.

INTERIOR SETTLERS

One Hundred New Families Between McE and Hazelton

PRINCE GEORGE, March 20.—During 1939 a total of 100 new families settled on land in the vicinity of Prince George and along the Canadian National Railways line east to McBride and west to Hazelton is the report of Harry Bowman, colonization agent for

the C. N. R. with headquarters at Prince George.

Most new settlers came from the prairie provinces and the United States, although there were 13 families direct from Holland and several direct from Switzerland.

Mr. Bowman states that prospects for new settlers this year from the prairies and United States points look extremely promising and that his advice suggests a good number will come from neutral countries in Europe, particularly Holland and Switzerland.
