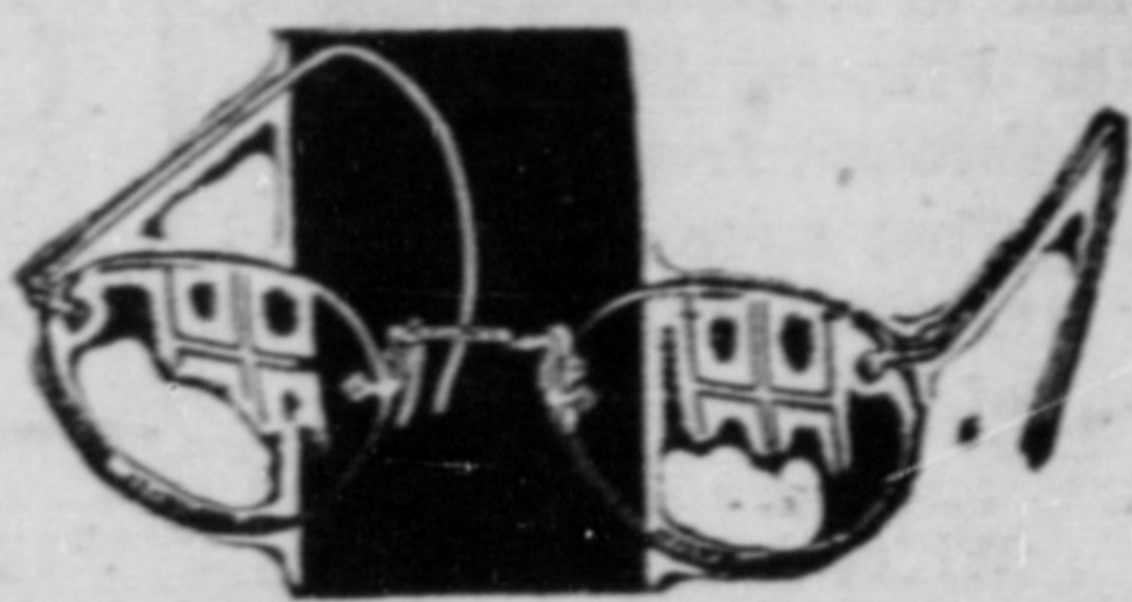


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AIR RAID WARNING

Assist In National Registration

There was a large attendance at
the City Hall last evening of
deputy registrars and voluntary
assistant deputy registrars to con-
fer on the procedure to be follow-
ed in the carrying out of the Na-
tional Registration on Monday,
Tuesday and Wednesday of next
week.

In opening the meeting, S.
Wilson, chief assistant registrar,
expressed on behalf of T. W.
Brown, registrar, appreciation for
the response to the appeal for as-
sistants. There was still need for
more assistants, however, and he
urged those in attendance to get
in touch with persons who could
write legibly and would be cap-
able of doing the clerical work
with a view to increasing the staff
of workers.

D. C. Stuart is in charge at the
Borden Street centre in Borden
Street School. G. L. Rorie is in
charge at the City Hall. W. W. C.
O'Neill at Booth Memorial High
School and M. R. Hill at Seal
Cove School. Persons who may
find it possible to give some time
in this voluntary work should get
in touch with these or with T. W.
Brown or J. S. Wilson.

Mr. Wilson outlined the work
that had been done and then a
general discussion followed deal-
ing with the various questions on
the forms that have to be filled in
by the registrants. A similar meet-
ing will be held this evening and
it is hoped another large turnout
of helpers will be on hand for
instructions. From experience in
filling out the forms several ques-
tions arose and the resulting dis-
cussion proved of great value.

Skeena River Salmon Pack This Year
Almost Up To 1939—Halibut Landings
For Week Quite Heavy—New
York Lawyer on Alaska
Cruise

The salmon pack for the Skeena River district up to
early in August was 154,754 cases as compared with 156,
143 cases at the corresponding date last year. While the
Skeena River pack was holding up well that on the Naas,
one of the lightest in years, was far down, the figure for
this year to date being 14,900 cases in comparison with

27,565 cases at the same time a year
ago. The sockeye pack on the
Skeena this year up to the time in
question was 102,468 cases as against
78,574 cases. The Naas River sock-
eye pack was but 6,982 cases in com-
parison with 14,871 cases. The
Skeena River pink pack this year
was 27,088 cases in comparison with
58,219 cases. The Naas River pack
of this variety was 6,456 cases as
against 10,834 cases a year ago. The
Rivers Inlet district shows a materi-
ally increased salmon pack this
year over last but that of the cen-
tral area is somewhat smaller.

Halibut landings at the port of
Prince Rupert for the 1940 season
up to and including yesterday had
reached a total of 12,909,019 pounds
in comparison with 11,985,700
pounds at a corresponding date
last year. The Canadian total was
5,292,019 pounds as against 5,546,
900 pounds and the American total
7,617,000 pounds as compared with
6,438,800 pounds. During the week
ending yesterday landings totalled
635,500 pounds consisting of 144,500
pounds Canadian and 491,000
pounds American fish. Prices dur-
ing the week remained steady. The
high bid for Canadian fish was 12c
and 8.5c which the Elvin S. was paid
for 32,000 pounds and the low 10.4c
and 7.5c which the Lake Biwa re-
ceived for 36,000 pounds. For Amer-
ican fish the high price of the
week was 12.6c and 8c which the
Antler was paid for 24,000 pounds
and the low 10c and 8c which several
boats received.

Leaving here yesterday aboard
the Campbell Church charter
yacht Caroline of Seattle was H.
Mrs. J. C. Moore, Indianapolis;
M. Flynt, New York barrister, and
party consisting of seven and com-
prising largely members of his own
family. The party had arrived this
morning aboard the Princess Lou-
ise from the south, disembarking
here. After a week's cruise as far
north as Juneau they will return to
Prince Rupert and proceed from
there by train next Friday morning
visiting Jasper Park and Banff on
the return trip home.

C.P.R. steamer Princess Louise,
Capt. S. K. Gray, which was in port
from 9 o'clock to noon yesterday
northbound from Vancouver to
Skagway, had a good-sized list of
185 passengers, 170 of whom were
round trip tourists. Seven persons
disembarked from the Princess Lou-
ise here. Two took passage here for
the north aboard her.

C.N.R. steamer Prince George,
Capt. H. E. Neddien, arrived in port
at 10 o'clock yesterday morning
from Vancouver and Ocean Falls,
sailing at 4 o'clock in the afternoon
for Stewart whence she returned
at 10 this morning to sail at 4 p.m.
on her return south. The Prince
George called at Nelson Bros. Fish-
eries Ltd. cannery on the ocean
dock both northbound and south-
bound.
