DEATHS AT SMITHERS

Three Well Known Residents Pass Away in As Many Days

SMITHERS, Jan. 25.—The third death in that many days at Smithers claimed William Bovill who was very well known here as a contractor. Mr. Bovill had been ill for several weeks; having suffered a stroke some time ago from which he had never completely recovered. He was a native of Belfast, Ireland, and had resided in Smithers for about twelve years. He was a widower, about 65 years of age, and lived with his son, James Bovill. Two other sons, John and William Bovill jr., reside in Smithers.

On Friday morning a well known bachelor farmer of the Glentanna district, Albert Karlsten, was found dead in his home. Neighbors had visited him the day previous and had made arrangements to look after his stock while he came in to hospital at Smithers but, upon visiting his home again on Friday morning, found him dead.

Another old timer of the Doughty district, between Smithers and Hazelton, William A. McMaster, was brought in to Smithers Hospital last week and passed away on Saturday. He was an elderly man and had farmed at Doughty for a number of years.

OCEAN FALLS

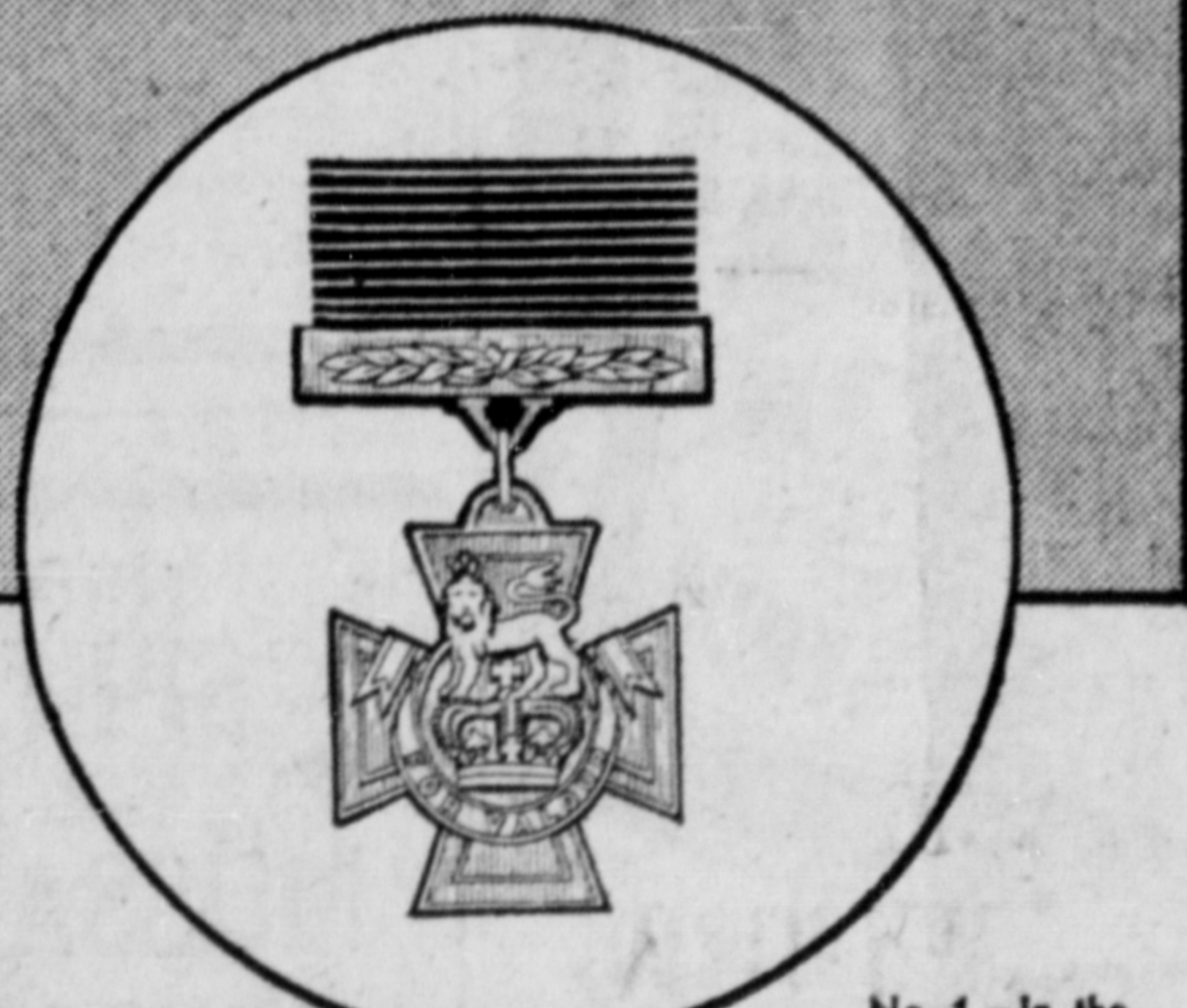

THE VICTORIA CROSS... "FOR VALOUR"

Most highly coveted decoration in the British Army. Instituted by Her Late Majesty, Queen Victoria, in 1856, this simple bronze cross, suspended from a crimson ribbon, is awarded to soldiers, sailors and airmen of all ranks for "conspicuous bravery or devotion to the country in the presence of the enemy." The Victoria Cross is the rarest of all British Decorations, and takes precedence over all other Orders and Medals. Recipients of the V.C. wear on the ribbon, when the ribbon is worn without the Cross in undress uniform, a miniature replica of the Cross in bronze and an additional replica if the Cross is awarded twice. Since the institution of the Victoria Cross it has been awarded to 1191 heroes of the Empire. Recipients are entitled to use the letters V.C. after their names.
