

EXTRAVAGANT STATEMENTS

German war communiques continue to make extravagant statements in regard to alleged German victories on the sea. Most of these are false. Had they all been true the British navy would have been badly decimated by now. When a trawler is sunk by the Germans they report it as being a troop ship or a cruiser. Seldom is there a true report issued. The campaign of lies and general misinformation continues. If the German people were told the exact truth they would probably be very uneasy.

HISTORY OF AGGRESSION

A writer in the San Francisco Examiner of recent date says:

"It was Germany's invasion of Belgium, her sabotage of our industries, her penetration in South America, and her brutal history of aggression since the time of Frederick the Great that made America an enemy of Germany."

"Nazi Germany learned nothing from the last war. She started out by killing or driving her liberal leaders into exile, by robbing the Jewish people of their property and interning them in concentration camps to die of starvation and abuse. She conducted her invasion of Poland with the utmost savagery—and a total lack of humanity and decency. But adding to the crimes committed against her European neighbors an army of spies and saboteurs invaded North and South America with the announced intention of promoting revolution in the United States and South America. This penetration in South America is already dangerous to the peace of the Western Hemisphere."

"If Nazi Germany would confine her conquests to Europe we might be neutral, but Hitler's 'Mein Kampf' and the public utterances of her leaders show Nazi Germany's aim to be world-wide revolution and complete world domination."

"If you do not think Nazi Germany intends to destroy America read 'The Revolution of Nihilism' by Hermann Rauschning, a one-time party member of the Nazi inner councils. Every American should read this ominous revelation of the Nazi doctrine, that will, if not stopped, conquer the world with fire and sword."

Enthusiasm Displayed By Crowd Of Forty At Annual Meeting Last Night

The annual meeting of the Prince Rupert Softball Association last night was a very enthusiastic gathering with about forty supporters of the game in attendance. Much enthusiasm for the forthcoming season was displayed. W. F. Stone was re-elected president and W. J. Scott, secretary-treasurer. The executive will consist of team captains in addition to the two officers.

The Senior League this season is expected to number eight or ten teams. Already mentioned as prospective entries are Grotto, Lipsett's, Moose, Irish Fusiliers, Canadian Scottish, National Motors, Malkin's Stone's Clothiers and a team being organized by Art Murray. Teams will be limited to twelve players, new players to be assigned by the executive.

An Intermediate League is also in prospect. Entries are to close on Saturday night of this week. Next Monday there will be another meeting of the executive to make further arrangements for the season.

SPORT CHAT

One of the biggest seasons of outdoor sport Prince Rupert has seen in many years appears looming up for 1940. Activity promises to compare with that of the old days—and some of us still remember them—when baseball and football were in their heyday before the First Great War when the railway, dry dock and such projects were under construction and around the end of the war when shipbuilding was at its height. Those were the "good old days" of sport in Prince Rupert which 1940, judging from present indications, gives promise of simulating.

Organization of football for the coming season has now been almost perfected. Players of the five teams are now whipping into shape for league play which commences next week with the getting under way of the Stuart Benefit Shield series followed by the competitions for the other soccer silverware.

Softball organization as expected, got under way with the holding of the annual meeting last night. The "rounders" game had a good season in 1939 with four teams in play. In 1940 there is reason to believe that there will be even more activity and enthusiasm with a Senior League which may have as many as eight teams.

There are also rumors of a revival of interest in baseball which not only in Prince Rupert but in many other places, has been hard hit by softball in the last few years. It is being suggested that a

three team senior baseball league may function in Prince Rupert this year. The diamond situation will become more clearly crystallized at an annual meeting which is to be held shortly.

The establishment of Prince Rupert as a base of military and naval operations since last year is one factor that is responsible for the great revival in sports this year. Expansion of construction and industrial activity here is another reason. More talent and fans have thus been provided. It is just another sign of the better times and greater population.

What is taking place in junior sport is also reflected in senior and intermediate—to say nothing of the ladies who, it is understood, are to have their softball again this year. School sports—football, softball and baseball—appear to be drawing more attention than ever. All this is a very good sign of community health—physical and otherwise.
