### EDITORIAL

#### EXPECT THE UNEXPECTED

When Norway was invaded by Germany it was the unexpected that happened. When some other big move takes place it may be the unexpected. Nobody seemed to think that Germany had anything to gain from the invasion of Norway and yet that was the country to which Hitler turned his attention, evidently in the hope that he could prevent the British Navy from stopping shipment of ore from Narvik. That there will be another move pretty soon almost goes without saying—in which direction nobody knows.

#### PALSIFY OF SPIRIT

The Chicago Daily News, commenting on the present world situation and the attitude of United States to it says that the Finns, Norwegians, Swedes and Danes went to Scandinavia to find liberty. Now their freedom is being trampled upon and their democratic institutions being turned to economic slavery. The paper then continues:

"Is it possible that we do not care? Have we become so abject in our posture toward the rest of the world that we dare not speak? Have we so far succumbed to peace-at-any-price dogma that we are afraid to tell the world just what we think of foul wrong done to peoples whose only crime was to believe in, and practice, liberty, near their families in the fear of God, do justice among themselves and deal fairly and justly with all other nations?"

"What is this palsify of spirit that has come over us? Why do our public men, disregarding the multiplied evidences that American sympathy is overwhelmingly with those who fight against such dictatorships as those of Hitler and Stalin, seek after the applause of the timid few who tremble before the ruthlessness of a bloody-handed tyrant, and would shush every utterance that told in simple words of American abhorrence of the Stalin-Hitler alliance, and its brutal inhumanity, injustice and rapine, practised at the expense of those who cannot defend themselves?"

"How long is it to be before we Americans face the realities of the situation that is unfolding before our eyes? We can not continue to trust blindly in ultimate Allied victory over Hitler. We should begin to think of our own situation, in the entirely possible event that Hitler wins. That could happen!"

It's interesting to know when reading the Daily News that the people of the whole district are doing the same.
