EDITORIALS

English Women Militant . . .

"No Germ is going to get out of England alive. The women'll go for him." Such is the theme of an article published this month in "Chatelaine." It tells of the experiences of a woman on a tour of investigation who finds that "England Has Gone Tough." Rosita Forbes finds that the women of England are militant and that if Hitler or his forces land in that country they will have to fight the women as well as the men. She finds that the people are not concerned about defending England. What they want is to get to Germany, to carry the war to the enemy.

According to the writer, one man said: "The German civilians wouldn't feel so satisfied reading about women and children bombed in our farms and villages if they knew the plans we've got for them. Our politicians can wear kid gloves if they like but, when our men get at the Nazis, there won't be anything party-like or pretty."

One lady kept a hatchet in the parlor designed for use on parachutists. She said: "I don't care what I do so long as I can kill a German. They shot my son at Dunkirk, shot him when he was wounded and unarmed, lying half in the water. They aren't men. They're beasts and I don't care what I do to them. I've thought it all out."

A farmer concluded a statement by remarking: "No Germans who land here are going to live to get any farther." The country has gone back to the time of King Alfred when the people all fought for Britain with steel, stone and wood.

A girl ambulance driver, returned from France, told of German wounded buried by their own comrades before they were dead, of bodies kicked and heaped into trenches and earth flung on top of them whether they were alive or not. "At last England, our own England, too civilized perhaps after the last twenty years of as much talk as work and more play than is good for any people, realizes what she is up against." The British realize now that you can't win a war by talking and they are determined that, if the Germans land in the country, none will be left to tell the tale.

Thought as Force . . .

On several occasions we have mentioned the power of mind in both war and peace. An American versifier has expressed it as follows:

"If you think you're beaten, you are;
If you think you dare not, you don't;
If you'd like to win, but you think you can't,
It's almost a cinch that you won't;
If you think you'll lose, you're lost;
For in this world you'll find—
That success depends on strength of will,
It's all in the state of mind."

WON THRU FIELDING

Observer Tells How Cincinnati Won Pennant For Second Straight

CINCINNATI, Oct. 1: (CP) — The other three National League first division clubs may well ask of the Cincinnati Reds, who have nailed the pennant to the mast for the second straight year, "What have they got that we haven't got?"

Certainly not batting, the power which wins ball games simply by breaking the opposing pitcher's heart. The Reds barely stayed in first division in team batting with an average of some .260, says John Frye, Associated Press baseball reviewer.

TO COUNTER NIGHT RAIDS PRODUCE ON HUGE BASIS

Britain Said To Be Developing Armament Production Of United States Fully Organized Now

LONDON, Oct. 1: — A new method of countering night air attack is being developed by the British tonight in the defence of London and will be in operation within one to three months, it is said. Details are not immediately disclosed. It is believed it may be a new and revolutionary type of combat plane.

Since the success of the Predictor the authorities have been working on a new secret anti-aircraft defence weapon which will make the defence of London much more effective, it is said.
