BREN GUN CONTRACTS

Hon. Ian Mackenzie has been much criticized for letting contracts for the manufacture of Bren guns to a firm that did not have a factory. At that time no firm in Canada was equipped for the manufacture of Bren guns so that whoever went into it had to start from the ground up. The company that received the contract is so well ahead with the work that the guns will be delivered six months ahead of the contract date. Those who have visited the plant say that it is well equipped and fully capable of handling this or any other orders that may be given it. So confident were the contractors of their ability to show that they were all right that they invited members of the investigating committee to visit the plant, which they did and most of them were quite satisfied with what they saw.

There have been certain journals in Canada, who are said to represent one or more disappointed firms, who have consistently campaigned against Captain Mackenzie and are said to have declared that they would drive the late minister of defence out of public office.

We should like to repeat here that Mr. Mackenzie is the only minister in any administration that has recognized Prince Rupert in the matter of defence. As a result of his efforts two efficient forts have been built to defend the harbor and work is well under way on an airport that promises to be a very important feature of the defences of the coast.

Mr. Mackenzie does not need us to defend him. He is laying his case before the people of Vancouver and is asking for their endorsement. If they give it, we hope we shall hear no more of the objections to the minister. If they do not endorse him, it will be a sign that the disappointed manufacturers have accomplished their purpose.

TWO PATROL BOATS SUNK

LONDON, Feb. 12.—The British Admiralty admits the sinking of two armed trawlers—H. M. S. Robert Bowen and H. M. S. Fort Royal—by German aircraft. Four officers and eighteen men were lost. After bombs failed, aerial torpedoes were used to sink the ships. This makes twenty-seven British naval vessels so far lost in the war.
