Thousand Anzacs Are Landed At Suez For War Service Of Allies

SUEZ, Egypt, February 12: (CP)— Allied forces in the Near East have been joined by one of the greatest armies ever transported by sea. They were the New Zealanders and Australians to the number of about thirty thousand men who were landed here today.

Rt. Hon. Anthony Eden, Secretary for the Dominions, was here to meet the troops at the end of their ten thousand mile voyage. All were volunteers.

Reuters said that the great armada of transports and British warships were anchored as far as the eye could see. Later they were disembarked and made camp at the edge of the desert.

Their addition to the already heavy concentrations of Allied troops in the Near East increased the belief here that a new war front would be opened in the spring in the Balkans or the Caucasus.

Foreign military observers said that British and French forces in the Near East now total at 570,000 men.

OTTAWA, Feb. 12: (CP)- Confirming rumors that had been heard a few days ago, the British High Commissioner's office here Saturday announced that Great Britain had placed a new order for military planes valued at about \$30,000,000 with the Canadian Associated Aircraft.

WAR COURSE WILL ALTER

Sir Kingsley Wood Advises Britons To Be Prepared-Lusso-German Relations Uncertain-Air Force Superior

BRISTOL, Feb. 12: (CP)-There are stirring times and new perils ahead, declared Sir Kingsley Wood, Secretary of State for Air, in speaking here. Britons should not be deceived by the present course of the war. It might soon change.

The Secretary for Air paid tribute to the air services for the part they had so far played in the war, having withstood the test of both battle and storm. Far more German to three years' imprisonment by planes had been brought down than the British had lost.
