## GRANTS FOR BOYS' BAND

The Prince Rupert Rotary Club yesterday voted the sum of \$150 to the Boys' Band committee to be used for the purchase of new instruments. It was also announced that the city was giving \$150 for a similar purpose. Other organizations, it was understood, were being asked to contribute.

Dr. Neal Carter, on behalf of the committee, stated that the new instruments were badly needed. As the Rotary Club had been largely instrumental in starting the band, and the instruments were now worn out, he moved that the sum recommended by the directors be voted.

H. F. Pullen reminded the club that when the band was started, the club guaranteed the salary of the instructor for two years besides providing some instruments. He reminded them of the early efforts of the band in public which were very hard. Today the boys played well and should be encouraged to carry on. He seconded the motion.

F. W. Winslow said there were several instruments and two in the condition. Others would have to be renewed. The parents now

guaranteed to raise the money for upkeep of the band and what was needed was new instruments. The parents had raised \$150 which would purchase two or three and the money now voted would pay for two or three and the same would occur as a result of the city's donation.

The club unanimously approved the vote.

## Dental Work Will Be Carried On By Rotary Committee

The Prince Rupert Rotary Club, at its meeting yesterday, decided to carry on the dental work among the children of the city. The new health officer at Victoria advised that it was more advantageous to carry on practical work than the clinic as heretofore. The committee, headed by John Dybhavn, was given authority to proceed with the work and the sum of \$200 was voted for the purpose. The department at Victoria will be asked to co-operate, as before.
