ARE NOW DUE TO BE FILED BY:-

(1.) Employers, respecting salaries and wages paid to employees during the calendar year 1939.

(2.) Every person in receipt of salary, wages, or investment income. These Returns are required to be filed not later than

## FEBRUARY 29th, 1940

Taxpayers should obtain forms from any Provincial Government office or chartered bank in the Province.

An urgent request is made for these Returns to be filed as much in advance of the final date as possible to enable the Department to give better service to taxpayers than can be provided during the rush of the

Corporation, business, or professional income is required to be returned within three months after the end of the taxpayer's fiscal year.
