Sweden may be the home of the Nobel peace prize, but it is also equipped for meeting trouble if trouble is forced upon it. Here are some of the Swedish tanks that form a part of the defence force. These tanks, rated as among the world's most efficient, are equipped with two-way radio and can travel over rough terrain at 28 m.p.h. Swedish armament factories are acknowledged to turn out the best and most modern army equipment in the world, and it is ironic that much of Germany's armaments were made either in Sweden or from Swedish steel.

RANGERS IN LEAD ARMSTRONG IS WINNER BEAVERS WIN OUT

New Yorkers Continue Sensational Winning Streak To Assume League Leadership

Knocked Out Joe Ghnoully Of St. Louis In Fifth Round Last Night

Defeat Wanderers For First Win In League

NEW YORK, Jan. 5: (CP)—Continuing their sensational winning streak which has now given them sixteen straight undefeated starts, New York Rangers last night won by a score of six to two over their fellow townsmen, the New York Americans, to bound into undisputed possession of first place in the National Hockey League standing. The Toronto Maple Leafs were defeated two to one by the Black Hawks at Chicago, and are in a tie with the idle Boston Bruins for second place. In the third fixture last night, the Montreal Canadiens were defeated by the Detroit Red Wings who, as a result, are now tied with the Americans for sixth place.

ST. LOUIS, Jan. 5: (CP)—Henry Armstrong successfully defended his world's welterweight boxing title last night by knocking out Joe Ghnoully of St. Louis in thirty-four seconds of the fifth round. It was scheduled for a fifteen round bout.

Football was resumed in the King Edward High School League when the Beavers won from the Wanderers by one goal to nil. The game was very closely contested but the Beavers deserved their win which was their first in the league.

Mairs was in good form for the Beavers and stopped several hard shots, two from Joe Davies being very good saves. Menzies and C. Pilfold were reliable backs while Rupert Holkestad played hard all through. Everett Pierce tried hard but combined poorly. Kiawahara was good and Ormiston, who came on near the end, was useful. Haugan got the goal.

Joe Davies was the pick of the Wanderers who were short of players all through. Bud Pierce played hard but must learn to pass more. Itsuo Matsumoto was good while little D Scherck promises to develop. Leland and Teng do not take the game seriously enough.

The Telkwa boys made a good showing and, with some practice, they will probably develop into a team that will give a good account of itself in the local league this winter. Owing to lightness of the run in Prince Rupert Harbor, most of the herring seinboats which have been operating there have moved to the vicinity of Namu, down the coast, where a more substantial run has developed.
