## IN HALL OF FAME

Tex Carleton Pitches No-Hit No-Run Game for Brooklyn Dodgers

NEW YORK, May 1: (CP)—Tex Carleton, who was last year rescued from Milwaukee in the American Association, yesterday entered baseball's hall of fame by pitching a no-hit no-run game for the Brooklyn Dodgers to win 3 to 0 over Cincinnati Reds. By winning the game Brooklyn made it nine straight victories without a loss since the opening of the season, equalling the record of the New York Giants for this feat. Pete Coscarart's homer, after Pitcher Jim Turner had yielded two walks accounted for the scoring. The Chicago Cubs won an 8 to 7 ten inning victory over Boston Bees and moved into a tie with the idle New York Giants for third place in the national league. The Pittsburgh Pirates lost to the Phillies.

### American League

In the American League the Cleveland Indians defeated Philadelphia Athletics and assumed exclusive possession of first place, the Boston Red Sox, with whom they had been tied, losing to Chicago Cubs. The Washington Senators defeated Detroit Tigers and the two teams are now tied for third place. The St. Louis Browns won a close 2 to 1 victory over the world champion New York Yankees and replaced them at the top of the second division.

## HAD GREAT FOLLOWING

Through the first two decades of the twentieth century no singer in concert or opera had a greater following than Mme. Louisa Tetrazzini who is dead in Milan, Italy.

She was a success from her debut in her native city of Florence, in 1895 but it was not until she made her first American appearance in San Francisco ten years later that she was acclaimed one of the greatest sopranos of her time.

After her Florence debut Mme. Tetrazzini sang in other cities of Italy and toured Spain, Portugal and Russia. In each of those countries she established herself as a popular favorite with patrons of opera.

Shortly after the turn of the century she went to South America and at Buenos Aires repeated the successes she had scored in Europe. Continuing her tour, she next sang in Mexico and then went to San Francisco.

Her appearances at San Francisco greatly enhanced the reputation of Mme. Tetrazzini and finally she essayed her fortune in London. There, in 1907, she made her debut at Covent Garden as Violetta in "La Traviata" and immediately established herself as a singer and actress.

Oscar Hammerstein then sought Mme. Tetrazzini for the Manhattan Opera Company in New York. She made her debut in New York under Hammerstein's management in "La Traviata" January 15, 1908, and proved a sensation. Later she appeared with the Metropolitan, Chicago and Boston Opera Companies with concert tours between her opera engagements. From 1908 to the end of her active career, Mme. Tetrazzini's principal engagements were in the United States and England.

### Father Was Merchant

Mme. Tetrazzini was born in 1874 at Florence, Italy. Her father was a merchant. Her brother was a stage director at Barra and possessed a good tenor voice while her two sisters made names for themselves in the musical world. One was a teacher at Milan and the other, Eva, who became the wife of Campanini, noted conductor, also was a music teacher and widely known as a singer.

Louisa's early musical education was obtained from her sister Eva and for the most part from observation. She was closely associated with Eva while the latter practised her operatic roles at home and in this manner Louisa, before she was 12, had learned the words and music of several operas including "Faust" and "La Gioconda." She showed such remarkable progress that she was sent to Ceccherini.

The mother of the singers was opposed to Louisa following the profession of her sisters but permitted her to pursue her vocal studies. Her public debut came to be regarded as inevitable and when the time arrived for it the

parental objections were easily overcome, partly because it was an emergency engagement. A performance of "L'Africaine" had been arranged to be given in Florence and the company was complete with the exception of the singer for the part of Inez. After a trial, Tetrazzini was engaged for the role for a period of four months at \$100 a month. At the end of that time she was re-engaged and her salary doubled.

When the training of Mme. Tetrazzini's voice began it was a deep contralto. It soon began to extend upward, however, and eventually she was able to sing in all in such operas as "The Magic Flute" and "La Sonnambula." At the height of her career her voice was a coloratura soprano of exceptional power, clarity and beauty. Combined with her ability as an actress it made her

a general favorite with audiences wherever she appeared. Mme. Tetrazzini's repertoire included nearly 40 operas and has been identified generally with the gold medal of the Royal Harmonic Society of London. Early in her career Mme. Tetrazzini was married to J. O. Bazzani. The famous singer was the world-wide notice when she came a bride for the second time in October, 1928. On that occasion she was married to Pietro Tetrini, twenty years her junior and tenant of her home in Rome. Three years later the singer obtained a legal separation, a Rome court on a plea of incompatibility.
