### Nazi Bomber Brought Down In Essex Town Of Clacton; Crew And Civilians Killed

LONDON, May 1: (CP)—Crash of a German bomber shot down by anti-aircraft guns and explosion of its deadly load of mines and bombs at the east coast resort town of Clacton-on-Sea today killed the Nazi crew of five and caused England's first civilian air raid casualties-three dead and more than one hundred injured. The explosion destroyed three houses, damaged fifty others and left a huge crater in a residential district street.

Marauding German planes also visited the Hull district at the mouth of the Humber River yesterday but were chased out to sea where machine gun fire was later heard.
